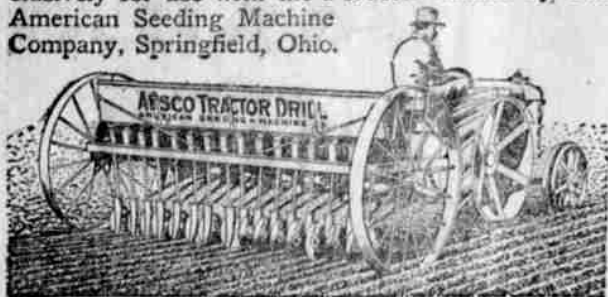

England Is Very, Very Wet

(Editors Note: Prohibition, pro and con, in spite of the fact that it is the law of the land, has been re-injected in politics this fall and is a lively topic on the street corners and in the clubs and drawing rooms. The subject of liquor on American-owned ships has recently been aired inside and outside of congress. In view of this, we believe the series of stories presented herewith from London, Paris, Berlin and Rome, the European capitals most frequented by Americans on summer tour, are particularly timely. They are not presented as an argument for or against prohibition, but merely as a pen-picture of conditions abroad with an occasional side-light on the American on continental playgrounds.)

CHAPTER I.
LONDON, July 5.—(United Press.)—With thirty Americans pouring in to London and Paris by every boat-train, the hardeners of the capitals of Europe are working overtime.

Just to jazz things up, so to speak, the anti-boose leagues are telling the world that they are at the point of staging the bluest prohibition campaign Europe has ever seen. "Pussyfoot" Johnson is here to take a hand. An army of "Pussyfooters" has invaded Sweden with a view to turning the plebiscite to be held, July 27, in favor of the dregs.

Another little army has made a trip to Denmark where drink conditions, so the "Pussyfooters" declare, are only beaten in all their luridness by Berlin, the King-Pin Boozing-City of the world.

Investigations show that in Sweden and Norway only fourteen per cent alcohol drinks are allowed, but that by the gentle art of sneaking around, it is easy enough to get a drink capable of laying out a troupe of elephants.

Denmark is completely wet, and the hardy Danes have no intention of going on the water wagon. Their chief drink is con de vie and a strong gin, and sooner than give it up they would fight a Dane told the United Press.

France, with Italy, the blazest wine-drinking country in the world, is as wet as usual. Prohibition officials point out that there is a falling off in consumption of wines and spirits in France, while Italy, during the last ten years, has increased her consumption of spirits (apart from wines) 75 per cent.

Iceland, after a lengthy siege of "drought" has taken a long step in the direction of sanctification (liquor selling). The Icelandic parliament has formally approved importation of Spanish wines. It was virtually forced to accept because the Spaniards, in retaliation for the old Icelandic barrier on salmon, had refused to accept fish shipments from the little Northern island.

Iceland must sell fish, and Spain was a big consumer.

Americans in England, American visitors to England seem

most interested in the prices of liquor and the kind obtainable.

Here one can get anything, at most anytime, save between 3:30 and 5:30 in the afternoon, and a couple of hours in the morning.

For what amounts to \$2.50 per quart, one can buy the best Johnny Walker whisky. In the pubs, a whisky highball costs you but fifteen cents.

Burgundy, claret, sell from \$1.50 a quart up. The same applies to port and after dinner sherry.

Liqueurs, of course, cost more, but for four dollars one of those bottles of green chartreuse is yours just as a bottle of benedictine or grand marnier can be bought for the same money.

Buy all the booze you want in England and nobody cares. Buy a shipload, or a modest half pint, and good luck to you and the trade is the attitude adopted in this land, where the workman's "art pint" is his god, and the dual champagne is more truth than fiction, in spite of the novelists, who write "The Duke quaffed his champagne at a gulp."

Truth will out. He does.

Liquor restrictions in England are few. But to some Americans even those few are annoying. The other day an American was raising Cain in a West End hotel because he couldn't get a drink between 3:30 and 5:30.

"Get you got to grumble about it," asked the porter, "aven't you come from a dry country?"

Of course, when you live in England and you are of an alcoholic disposition, it is the easiest thing in the world to provide against those few hours by buying all you want at a local wine shop.

THREE ARE DEAD

NOGALES, Ariz., July 5.—(United Press.)—Three are dead in Mazatlan, Sinaloa, according to advices received today relating to the details of an alleged hot shooting.

Ignacio Hipon, part owner of "La Ciudad de Paris," a large Chinese grocery, Dolores Bajorez de Aguilar, who kept an adjoining store, and Ernesto Ley, Chinese, said to be the assassin of the former two, are those reported dead.

According to reports, Ley dressed well, and having the appearance of a prosperous merchant, entered Hipon's store and asked to purchase a quantity of cereal. When Hipon led him to the rear of the store to inspect the stock, Ley suddenly opened fire with an automatic revolver and Hipon fell, mortally wounded.

The woman who happened to be in the path of the fleeing murderer was shot down and died instantly. As the double assassin entered the street, Alfonso Hipon, brother and partner of the dead man, rushed from the warehouse in the rear of the store and gave chase. Hipon gained ground until he was within a few feet of the fugitive, and then fired three shots into his body.

Authorities who quizzed those connected with the affair believe that Ley was the representative of one of the Chinese factions in the present civil war. He had arrived the morning of the shooting from Guaymas, 500 miles distant, probably with the express intention of killing one or both of the Hipons, it was said.

ONION SMUT PROBLEM SOLVED BY EXPERIMENTS

CORVALLIS, July 5.—Onion smut, which has been destroying a large part of the onion crop in the northern Willamette valley, may be controlled by use of a formaldehyde solution when planting, according to H. P. Baras, head of the department of botany and plant pathology.

Onion smut, a fungus disease, infects the soil, and has led to the abandonment of some of the best ground, according to Professor Baras.

Experiments have been conducted through the cooperation of the botany and plant pathology department, Oregon experiment station, and farm bureau of Washington county. They have found that a formaldehyde solution, in the proportion of one ounce of formaldehyde to a gallon of water, run into the drill row from a tank on the seeder, through a tube having a five-sixteenth inch bore, is the most effective method of controlling the smut.

Last year land treated in this manner yielded 364 sacks of onions per acre, while adjoining land produced only 88½ sacks.

This year effort was made to test the efficacy of dusting the seed with various materials, but this was found to be of only slight benefit. When powdered copper carbonate was dusted into the drill rows well mixed with soil covering, a definite benefit was evident. It remains to develop a machine to deliver the dust effectively, since the hand method is impracticable. Whether an effective mechanical means for dusting the soil can be found remains to be seen. The experiment station will work on this problem another year, says Professor Baras.

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO IMPROVE ROWE STREET.

That at a meeting of the Common Council of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, held on the 14th day of June, 1922, the following resolution was adopted:

"RESOLVED, That the Common Council of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, deems it expedient and necessary and hereby proposes to improve Rowe Street from the west line of Winchester Street to the east line of the Oregon and California Railroad Company Right of Way, in the City of Roseburg, Oregon, in the following manner:

First: By grading the street to the proper sub-grade.

Second: By paving the roadway of said street twenty feet in width with concrete pavement.

Third: By constructing sub-drains, if necessary.

Fourth: By constructing street monuments.

Fifth: By laying vitrified sewer pipe, if necessary.

Sixth: By constructing catch-basins, and inlets.

Said improvements are to be made in accordance with the Charter and Ordinances of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, and the grade, plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer, filed in the office of the City Recorder on the 19th day of June, 1922, which said improvements are hereby approved and adopted.

One half of the paving costs of said improvement shall be assessed upon the property especially benefited thereby, as provided by the Charter of said City, and in accordance with the petition of the property owners to be benefited by said improvement, and the remainder of said costs shall be paid by the City of Roseburg.

The estimate of the City Engineer of the probable detailed cost of said improvement is the sum of \$2037.55.

"RESOLVED, That the City Recorder of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, be and he is hereby directed to give notice of said proposed improvement as provided by the Charter of said City."

Remonstrances against said proposed improvement may be filed with the undersigned within twenty days from the first publication of this notice which is the 21st day of June, 1922.
