TANGLED PROCESSES OF COURT RETARD PROFITEER TRIALS

WASHINGTON, July 5.—Hordes of war grafters will get away—immune from the law's clutches—because of the slow and tangled processes of the courts.

Federal court procedure, in the face of the crush of litigation now confronted through war frauds mainly, is found to be wholly inadequate. Court rules mostly were made to fit the business of the courts fifty years ago. Thousands of cases which have been investigated, and revealed sufficient proof to convict those who were caught "red handed" in robbing the government during and since the war, now must hang fire indefinitely.

Just as congress voted \$500,000 to further enable the attorney-general to hire additional legal talent, and to expedite prosecution of the grafters, word comes from the attorney-general that the department of justice is far ahead of the courts, and the department simply will have to mark time to wait for the courts to catch up with the business now lagging on their hands.

The answer to such a situation is that defendants or material witnesses will disappear in numerous cases, or important evidence will lose its effectiveness because of the long delays which now are expected to defeat that government's program in some of its more important aspects.

The attorney-general has begun to expand his war graft division, to probe war contracts. He expects to expedite this work as much as possible. The evidence gathered, however, although valuable in securing indictments, means little in the ultimate conviction of the defendants so long as federal judges are not available to try them.

Illustrating the jam of the courts is the inability of the attorney-general to have the cement anti-trust cases brought to trial in New York before the last of the year. The cases involving the cement group in the middle west also will be delayed indefinitely probably until the beginning of another year.

The court jam also will seriously retard judicial sifting of the charges in the scores of anti-trust cases which are pending. Aggravating the condition of the dockets is the fact also that the federal judges are just beginning their summer vacation terms. The courts merely will lag along handling only emergency litigation, or cases which have stood on the dockets for two years or more.

Chief Justice Taft and other distinguished jurists have taken the lead in a movement to reform the rules of the judiciary. The effort is to modernize them, or rather to Americanize them along new lines and make them conform to the demands of larger business occasioned by the growth of the country.
