MOTOR CARAVAN  
TO TOUR STATE

Motor Equipment to Be Demonstrated at Various Points Throughout Oregon.

## PROGRAMS ARRANGED

Caravan Will Carry Its Own Lighting System and Radio Outfit, and Is to Give Programs at Places Where Stops Are Made.

Participated in by a dozen manufacturers and distributors of nationally known industrial and power farming equipment, a huge caravan is about to begin a tour embracing a period of three months, in which time it is proposed to cover a total mileage of approximately 4,000 miles embracing the whole of Oregon and several points on the Columbia River in Washington. The exact dates have not yet been announced.

Utilizing its own power and using the highways exclusively, about 40 trucks, trailers and tractors will be required to handle the entire equipment. Following a tour of all points between Portland and California line, brief stops being made enroute, a series of actual demonstrations will be made upon the return trip to Portland, where a huge show of two or three days' duration will be made prior to the departure of the caravan for points along the Columbia and in Central and Eastern Oregon.

Associated in the enterprise are the Ford Motor Company, featuring Ford trucks and the Fordson tractor, the Oliver Chilled Plow works and allied manufacturers of a complete line of farm implements distributed by the Oliver concern in the northwest; the Ersted Machinery Manufacturing company, showing the Ersted tractor-hoist; the Lee Line of contractors' dump bodies distributed by the Parsons-Gordon Co.; Hercules commercial truck bodies, distributed by the Francis Motor Car Co.; Talbot & Casey's Tractorbodies and a number of tractor specialties; the DeLco Light and other products of the Modern Appliance Co., and various additional features designed to show the completeness of every conceivable equipment for use with a truck or a tractor.

Appreciating the spirit of the exhibitors in attempting the enterprise upon so vast a scale, local business men are providing special programs at various points. There will be a clam-bake at Seaside, a barbecue at Oakland and similar events elsewhere at practically every point. Hand concerts, motion pictures, illustrated lectures, a daily radio program and similar affairs will be arranged for the evenings, as the caravan will carry its own lighting equipment and be in a position to otherwise provide for the convenience of all visitors, day or night. There will be no admission charge for any of the events at any point along the route.
