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TOO POPULAR WITH THE VILLAGE BELLS YOUNGSTER NEARLY BURNED AT STAKE

Rivals of Gay Young Lothario Plot to Eliminate Their Source of Worry and Tie Youngster to Stake in the Woods And Kindle Fire.

KINGSVILLE, Ontario, July 8.—Eddie Sanderson, schoolboy of Bellingham, Wn., was rescued yesterday while being burned at the stake in the woods near this city by irate youngsters, who resented the attentions he was receiving from a popular girl in Kingsville.
Eddie, here visiting, promptly became popular with the girl, talking and visiting ice cream parlors, the girl showing him as her ideal.
Three boys, between the ages of 10 and 12 years, who liked the girl, became displeased and planned to end Eddie's visit.
Men passing through the woods heard the boy's screams, called smoke and rushed to the scene. They found Eddie tied to a stake, with the fire eating away up his legs.
Eddie at first refused to tell what happened but finally said that the boys chased him, carried him into the woods, kindled a fire and prepared to barbecue him.
He was not burned seriously, the doctors said.

Election Campaign Committee Named

PORTLAND, July 8.—Announcement of the appointment of a new executive committee to handle the city's campaign for the coming general election was made yesterday by Walter L. Toose, Jr., newly-elected public state chairman.
Twenty members, ten men and ten women, were named by Mr. Toose to represent the republican fight for the coming election. The first meeting of the new committee will be on Tuesday, July 13, at the Imperial hotel.
The appointment of the committee in pursuance of the resolution adopted at the meeting of the state executive committee, which called for the immediate appointment of a committee of men and women to direct the city affairs during the fall campaign. The resolution also provided that the national committee, the chairman and secretary be members of the executive committee and that these three latter members be accorded the privileges of full members.

Mrs. F. O. Northrup, all of Portland; Mrs. Louise Perozzi, Ashland; Mrs. John A. Carson Sr., Salem; Miss Anna M. Lang, The Dalles; and Mrs. Henry Henningson, Oregon City.
By coincidence, all masculine political workers of Portland were overlooked and this city's quota on the committee filled entirely by women.
Bruce Dennis, Lloyd Riches and Sumner S. Smith are newspaper men; Harold Baldwin is an eastern Oregon rancher and Roy D. Smith is a Hood River apple grower. The legal profession is well represented. Willard L. Marks, George Neuner Jr., E. E. Blanchard, and John C. Kendall are lawyers. E. C. Kirkpatrick is a hop buyer. Mr. Kendall is well known in political circles, having managed the campaign of Senator Charles Hall, candidate for governor in the May primaries.
Mrs. Davenport, Mrs. Runyon, Mrs. Dibble, Mrs. Lousion, Mrs. Northrup, Mrs. Perozzi and Miss Lang have had previous political experience, all having served before on republican committees.
Active plans for the coming campaign will receive the earnest attention of the new committee at the first meeting, according to Mr. Toose. With every section of the state represented, it is expected that a thorough plan of action will be mapped out.

DECLARES TURKS ARE KILLING AMERICANS

LONDON, July 8.—Americans are being secretly murdered by Turks in Asia Minor and reports are circulated that the deaths were due to typhus and other diseases, according to J. Herbert Knapp, a civil engineer of Los Angeles, who has arrived from Constantinople after three years in interior Turkey where he has been principally to investigate the death of his brother at Marbaki. George Knapp, who the Turks reported died of typhus. He declares that an investigation supported by affidavits, convinced him that his brother was executed by shooting.

It is planned to restore the old mansion, which was burned down several years ago, on the same site and convert it into a historical museum.

FRENCH WOMAN IS VICTOR IN TENNIS

Spectacular Playing Witnessed By 15,000 Spectators In England.

KING AND QUEEN THERE

American Woman Beaten by French Champ Who Takes Two Sets—Played Great Tennis at All Stages of the Game.

WIMBLEDON, England, July 8.—For the first time in history, America has a contestant in the tennis finals here. Mrs. Mollie Mallory, the American, played the French champion, the world's title today. Mlle. Lenglen was a three-to-two favorite over the American.

Both women were given a great reception when they came on the courts. Fifteen thousand spectators, including King George and Queen Mary, were in the stands.
Playing a great brand of tennis, which has earned her the reputation as the greatest of all women players, Lenglen took the first game on her superior service.
Mrs. Mallory took the second game.
The battle was vicious, spectacular tennis being played by both players.
Mlle. Lenglen took the first set 6-2.

Changing courts, the French girl extended herself and took every game in the second set, although Mrs. Mallory contested every point.
The American was erratic, driving into the net constantly.
The Lenglen score in the two sets, which earned the world's title, was a complete surprise.
The French girl had the American completely at her mercy in almost every department of the game.

AMERICAN DEFEATS BRITISH CHAMPION

HENLEY, England, July 8.—Walter Hoover, of Duluth, American champion singles sculler, won the world's championship on the Thames today when he defeated Jack Beresford, British champion in the "diamond sculls" final.

IRISH FIGHTING SOUTH OF DUBLIN

LONDON, July 8.—The chief Irish situation centers the operations in the Blessington district, 15 miles south of Dublin, county Wicklow, owing to the supposition that Eamon DeValera is with the Irish forces there. The republicans are tightly enclosed within a ring of the national troops and the final success of the government forces is awaited with confidence.

FINANCIAL COLLAPSE THREATENS GERMANY

BERLIN, July 8.—Germany today asked the reparations commission to grant a moratorium. The government reiterated its inability to meet the July 15th payments.
Berlin is quiet today, but the quiet was ominous. It is the general belief that complete political collapse and anarchy may follow the monetary disaster which has overtaken the country.
Crisis Is Feared.
LONDON, July 8.—A political and economic crisis throughout Europe is feared by Lloyd George as a result of the threatened financial collapse of Germany. It was learned authoritatively today. He believes the situation would probably result in dangers of Franco-German complications, the moratorium demand making the situation worse, according to his view. The British premier is more concerned regarding Germany than he is over any other European nation, including Ireland.

STRIKE RIOTS IN ILLINOIS SHOPS

CHICAGO, July 8.—Rioting continued in the Illinois shops today.
The homes of several workers were attacked.
Strike-breakers were taken from street cars and beaten.
Many women are working in the shops as strikebreakers, giving a wartime flavor to the strike.
The train service from Chicago was curtailed today, and many of the short line trains taken off.

SUPREME COURT SAYS MAHONEY MUST DIE

OLYMPIA, July 8.—The conviction and sentence of death of James E. Mahoney in the King county superior court for the murder of his aged, wealthy wife, Kate Mahoney, was upheld by the supreme court today.

CONSTRUCTION CAMP DESTROYED BY FIRE

PORTLAND, July 8.—The Reliance construction camp near Tillamook and the Washington county lines burned during the night. In many places in the Nehalem watershed the fires are racing through the crowns of the green timber on the Hammond company holdings. Fears are expressed that should the wind change to the east some of Oregon's most valuable lumber would be destroyed.
The heat is terrific and the men are having difficulty in making headway with the fighting. The high winds from the northwest are sweeping the woods in this section.

CARAVAN DATES TENTATIVELY SET

Will Be in Roseburg During Last Week of July for Demonstration.

ADVANCE MEN VISIT

Representatives of Monster Caravan Spend Short Time in Roseburg Discussing Plans With Local Ford and Fordson Dealers.

Advance representatives of the Ford and Fordson exposition of power farming and industrial trucks, tractors and appliances passed through Roseburg today completing arrangements with the C. A. Lockwood Motor company, who also will represent several of the additional concerns associated with the Ford Motor company in this project.
The first of a series of power farming and industrial demonstrations is scheduled for Ashland, Saturday, July 15, from which point the caravan will work back to Portland, stopping at all towns and cities along the route.
"No similar affair has ever been attempted in this country," said Mr. Lockwood. "The equipment, consisting of Ford trucks, Fordson tractors, the agricultural implements of the Oliver Chilled Plow works, the Ersted tractor hoist, Hercules commercial bodies, Lee Line contractors' dump bodies, the Trailmobile, Casey tractor appliances, and other features of the caravan represent a tremendous investment in modern industrial and farming apparatus. Approximately 50 men are accompanying the caravan. These men are experts on lubrication, the operation and care of trucks and tractors, farm machinery and industrial appliances, and in connection with the demonstration of each product there will be a series of brief talks and lectures."

After passing through Roseburg on Tuesday evening, July 11, the caravan will proceed southward to Ashland and return here for the actual demonstrations in about two weeks, subject to minor changes necessitated by road conditions or other factors beyond the control of those in charge of the program.
"In addition to the parade, demonstrations and lectures," continued Mr. Lockwood, "there will be motion pictures, radio concerts daily and evenings wherever the caravan stops, and a number of purely local entertainment and educational features now being planned and soon to be announced in the local press."
"Unquestionably, this is the greatest thing of its kind ever presented to the citizens of Roseburg, and the farmers of this section. Owing to the high cost of producing this spectacle, it is not likely to be shown here again, and all who miss either the preliminary parade southbound or the show itself upon the return trip may never again have the privilege of seeing such a sight. And, above all, we want every man, woman and child to understand that every part of this show is absolutely free, day or night, during the entire time of each show."

WYOMING MAN PURCHASES BEE ACREAGE IN TEXAS

CLEANLINESS EXPENSIVE IN MOSCOW; ONE BATH COSTS ABOUT THREE MILLION RUBLES

Woman Reporter Tells of Experiences In the Land of the Soviet—Declares Luxuries Are Sky High In Price—Much Cheaper In Germany.

MOSCOW, July 8.—I have just paid three million rubles for a bath. Cleanliness comes high in Moscow. Everything else does, too; everything costs regular New York prices and then some.

After all, three million rubles is only 75 cents, not too much to pay in America. But I have been spoiled by my year in Europe. Everything in Germany is cheap as dirt, if you know the language and where to buy. Moscow is the most expensive capital in Europe.
It is expensive even for foreigners with good American dollars. We folks have been accustomed since the war to exchanging our good money for a lot of paper money in Germany, or Austria, or Italy, and just buying up the country. Russia isn't going to let us do it. There are quite a lot of old New Yorkers who have got into the government of Russia, and they don't intend to be held up by anyone! They intend to do the holding up!

I told a comrade at Minsk how cheap everything was in Germany in comparison to Russia, and he replied dryly: "But that is just selling Germany away. Germany has to be on account of the reparations. But we do not have to sell out Russia."
Russia tried first to offer communism to the world—a system in which everyone would work hard and be given free of charge whatever he needed. She couldn't make her industries run on that basis. Partly this can be blamed on the war, the blockade and the famine and partly, as the communists themselves say: "Because there were not enough honest people in Russia—not enough people who would refuse to accept from society more than they returned. We must train up the next generation."

"State Capitalism."
So Russia has now retreated to what she calls "state capitalism." Everyone is free to go out and make money, to charge as much as they can and make any fortunes they can pile up. But let us not believe that this is capitalism as we have it in America. For the government itself is out in industry, competing in every line. The government runs the key industries and the biggest factories all over Russia; it runs them to make money. It sells the product for the market price and pays the workers according to what they produce. It intends to make all the money it can, to build up its surplus and to use that surplus for developing Russia. The government hopes to develop Russia toward communism, that depends on what happens in the rest of the world. As long as the rest of the world is on a capitalistic basis and money is the standard in foreign trade, Russia intends to have money and pay her own way.

Meantime she keeps up a running fight with the speculators. The speculators had the best of it during the winter, for the government's resources were drained to fight the famine. The speculators hoarded grain in hope of a rise; they speculated wildly in rubles, which sank every few days to half their previous value. Everything was tumbling.

Adventures Bread Loan.
Then suddenly, observing the chance of a good harvest, the government advertised a ten-million-dollar bread loan, selling at a low price flour to be delivered next winter. It suddenly made the paper ruble good, since you could pay paper rubles for food seven months ahead; it cut the price of flour and forced the speculators to unload. The Bread Loan shows every sign of being over-subscribed, which is quite a mark of success.

confidence of the people in the financial power of their government.
But how can the Russians themselves pay the high prices charged for everything? Germany has to keep her railroads bankrupt, because if she charged enough to run them the Germans could not afford to ride. All countries whose money is worth little in the world market have this problem.
But Russia can dare do things which the other countries cannot, because all her essential workers are on government rations and have practically free lodgings and free transportation when on public business. They should worry about rising prices. Let foreigners and speculators make money and pay money; there is another and a safer standard in Russia, along with this money standard.
A girl I know works as government stenographer; she got nine dollars last month for wages. She refused an offer of five times that sum to work for a private concern; she preferred the security of rations and lodging. Incidentally, she believed in her job.

Masons Plan For Outdoor Picnic

One of the big outdoor gatherings of the season will be the Masonic and Eastern Star Picnic in Huttons Grove on Friday, July 14th. Arrangements are being made for a one hundred per cent attendance and Masons and their families will be here from the nearby towns. Permission has been given by Mrs. Hutton to meet in their grove, and the joint committee from the Eastern Star Chapter and Myrtle Lodge are making complete arrangements for this affair.

Dean Bubar has promised to have railroads of good hot coffee and plenty of cream and sugar for everybody, and Bill Harris is going to take out enough ice cream and plates for every Eastern Star and Chapter member that attends. Charlie McElhinny will have charge of the community singing and everyone will be glad of this opportunity of again getting together on a picnic of this kind.

A few outside speakers will be present and make short addresses. Avery Roser, Paul Bubar and Mr. Wallace are charged with the responsibility of having plenty of food on hand for the cook and also the bon-fire committee.

The program will be short and snappy and games will be arranged that will interest everyone. It is a basket picnic and all will of course bring their own dinner and a cup for coffee and a plate for ice cream, also a knife, fork and spoon. LONDON, July 7.—Can a man be in love with two women at the same time?

This was the intriguing question raised by Dr. David Forsyth, well-known lecturer and writer of books on psycho-analysis, during the course of a lecture at the London Institute of Hygiene.
He admitted that in his opinion it was impossible.
"A man," he insisted, "has only a limited fund of love on which he can draw. Any affection that he gives to No. 2 means that something is withdrawn from No. 1."

To make this matter still clearer the lecturer added:
"A man can be 'head over heels' in love with only one woman at a time."
"He can be half in love with two women."
"He can be one-sixth in love with six women and one-twelfth in love with twelve women."
