Ancient Chinese Game Revived

SAN FRANCISCO, July 8.—(United Press.)—Mah Jongg, the oldest game in China, is the newest fad in the United States. Bridge tables at the tea rooms here more often than not nowadays are unused for bridge, while milady plays mah jongg with little tiles of bamboo and ivory.

Each domino with which the game is played is carved and painted in bright colors with Oriental symbols and the counters are short thin pieces of ivory with black spots on them. The sets are imported from the Orient.

The game is very scientific, and it is freely declared that bridge experts who are supposed to rank next to chess experts in the line of "scientific game nuts," declare they no longer get any kick out of auction after learning the Chinese game. One tea room here found the game so popular that they imported two pretty Chinese instructresses from local Chinatown to teach their patrons the art of mah jongg in the proper manner.

200 NAMES RECALL

Daughter of Labor Board Chief Becomes Secretary In Office of Her Father

CHICAGO, July 8.—Clinging to the "somewhat obsolete" theory that every girl should try to do something worth while, Miss Anna H. Hooper, 19 year old daughter of Ben W. Hooper, chairman of the United States railroad labor board, today is at work as "dad's private secretary."

The buoyant young daughter of the former governor of Tennessee meets callers at the labor board offices, takes dictation from members of the board, files letters, looks up reports and handles the job with the sang froid of her male predecessor.

Speaking with a soft southern drawl, Miss Hooper admitted she didn't have to work, but "just forced" "dad" to give her a chance to do something. She and "dad" always have been "pals" and she insisted on sharing some of his trials and tribulations as head of the railway labor board. The only thing flippant about her is her age, Miss Hooper, smilingly admitted.

"I won't bob my hair," she said. "Bobbed hair raises a question in the minds of people. I don't believe it's a good idea to be flippy. Bobbed-

haired girls are often superficial. I don't approve of extreme clothes either."

Train Crew Fights Fire to Save Family

PORTLAND, July 7.—Panned in all night by a wall of flame burning fiercely about their home near Southern Pacific tunnel 32 on the Portland-Tillamook line, Forest Ranger H. C. Hoover, his wife and baby were brought to safety this morning when a Southern Pacific train ran the gauntlet of the flames and reached the isolated home.

Reports reached here last night that the fire in the Tillamook country had run up a canyon near tunnel 32 and that Hoover and his family had been completely cut off. An engine hauling three great tankers and a flat car bearing pumps and hose stuck its nose into the fire zone and raced for tunnel 32.

Streams of water played on both sides of the right of way with men wrapped in wet cloths manning the hose nozzles. The train was halted several times when great burning snags thundered across the rails and axes and peavies were brought into play to make way for the rescuers.

Several trestles, ignited by flying embers, were sprayed and the flames quelled as the train raced through. Several times trees weakened by the flames gnawing at their bases roared down in the wake of the fire train.

At tunnel 32 a squad of fire fighters sprayed their way through the smoldering slashings where the fire had vented its fury and reached the Hoover home where the family was found unharmed.

The race back to safety was a replica of the run into the fire. Trees were cut away from the tracks and the train sprayed with a continuous stream of water until the crew, their faces blackened and many of them suffering severe burns, had skirted the last flame patch and reached safety with their charges.

These figures are arrived at by dividing the total savings by the number of farmers in America. And the tale is not half told. Other indirect benefits would fill pages. Two Judges to Hear Contest Suit

SALEM, July 8.—In order that there will be no part of the law that will be overlooked in the primary election contest, Judge George G. Bingham has asked Judge Percy R. Kelly to sit with him at the hearing. The coming contest is the first of its kind in Oregon, for never before has a case of the magnitude of the one now approaching come up under the corrupt practice act.

Both judges are in Salem and will go into conference concerning the meaning of the laws. Judge Bingham said yesterday, "I have read the law but as it has no precedents in Oregon, it will have to be interpreted by a close study of the facts, and a close study of the law itself." As to whether the case comes within the corrupt practice act, the judge would not say. He said that he would have to make a more careful study of the specific law defining the act. Should the motion to dismiss the case be entered by the contestee and then a demurrer to the facts follow which would bring the case back to trial, it would be possible to draw the legal contest to some length. The attorneys have not yet announced their plans.

Should the contestee win any one of the seven points, there will be sufficient ground for having the ballot boxes opened. The ballot boxes of the suspected districts are under the control of the court and can be opened and studied only in the court room. No other authority exists to open the ballot boxes. At least three days before the hearing the contestants must file a list of the persons known to have been fraudulently or illegally accepted as electors. Whether this or the counting of democratic ballots for republican nominees, the over-counting of the actual ballots as charged in several instances, or the Multnomah county refusal to allow Hall checkers at the ballot count, are points that will be up to the two judges for decision. It is also likely that as the law has never been tested in such a manner before, that there will be leaky spots found and it will take the best judgment of the two judges to construe the points to the satisfaction of the public.

Men Wanted

For service as railroad machinists, boilermakers, blacksmiths, electricians, sheet metal workers, pipe fitters, coppersmiths, tinners, car inspectors, car repairers, helpers—all classes under strike conditions best explained by Chairman Ben W. Hooper of the United States Railroad Board, in his statement of July 1st reading as follows: "In this case the conflict is not between the employer and the oppressed employees. The people of this country, through an act of congress, signed by President Wilson, established a tribunal to decide such disputes over wages and working conditions which are submitted to it in a proper manner. It is the decision of this tribunal against which the shop crafts are striking. Regardless of any question of the right of the men to strike the men who take the strikers' places are merely accepting the wages and working conditions prescribed by a government tribunal and are performing a public service. They are not accepting the wages and working conditions which an employer is trying to impose. For this reason, public sentiment and full government power will protect the men who remain in their position and new men who may come in." Adequate provisions have been made for the full protection of all new employees, the same as old employees who have remained loyally at work.
