

Wife of Exiled Egyptian Leader Will Spend Life Fighting for Husband's Freedom

America enjoys the honor of having made the ideas of liberty, justice and equality prevail between the nations of the world, big and little. Each time an oppressed nation shakes its chains and is reborn to enjoy independence and power, America wins a moral victory.

Giving a graphic description of the manner in which her husband was spirited away into exile, Mme. Zaghloul declared that she feels that the movement for his return from exile will eventually prevail. "It is quite natural that the Egyptian nation should claim by every peaceful means the return of their father and should not cease to protest against his exile," she said. "Ultimately the nation, I am convinced, shall triumph."

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CAIRO, July 11.—"As Saad Pasha Zaghloul has sacrificed his all for Egypt's sake, so will I sacrifice even the last drop of my blood." This is the dramatic statement made to the International News Service by Mme. Zaghloul, wife of the exiled leader of Egypt.

The interview was granted the International News Service on one of the Ramadan nights. Ramadan is a Moslem month during which all Moslems fast from morning till night. At sunset they break their fast and eat and drink with merry. Mme. Zaghloul was receiving her lady friends in one of the Ramadan night receptions when she was interviewed by the International News Service. As the correspondent was of her own sex, Mme. Zaghloul dropped the veil which usually covers her face.

Though she had requested that she be permitted to accompany her husband into exile she was refused, and Mme. Zaghloul stated that for days she waited for the desired permission to be granted. Then one day, she declared, "a sudden inspiration came to me—'You must not leave the country; your first duty is to remain and fight for the cause of independence like your husband.'"

Questioned concerning the present situation in Egypt, Mme. Zaghloul said: "I cannot understand a so-called independence which keeps the land under martial law. The liberty of the press is an empty word."

"I am of the opinion, as all the nation is, that the framing of the constitution ought to have been entrusted to a national assembly and not to a government. In all civilized countries, national assemblies are convoked to form a national constitution."

"The policy of Sarwat Pasha has failed to win the sympathy of the nation."

"As Saad Pasha Zaghloul has sacrificed his all for Egypt's sake, so will I sacrifice to the last drop of my blood."

RECALL NAMES LACKING

Valid Signatures Declared Insufficient After Check.

MEDFORD, July 11.—According to the checking of the recall petitions against Sheriff Terrill by the county clerk, 1652 signatures are not registered voters, leaving 1,088 names of the 1,740 on the petitions. Under the law 1256 names are required.

The county clerk will decide Tuesday whether he will strike out the names which would automatically kill the recall. Mandamus proceedings are threatened by John J. Jeffreys, attorney, of Portland, if he does.

139 KILLED IN YEAR.

Salem, July 10.—During the year ending July 1 a total of 139 men subject to the Oregon workmen's compensation act were killed in industrial accidents, according to a report prepared here today by the state industrial accident commission. Eight other men who had elected to come under the workmen's compensation act received injuries which left them permanently incapacitated.

The cost of these 147 cases to the state industrial accident commission fund was \$524,599.75, or an average of \$3571.32 each. Of the 139 fatal cases, 57 left no dependents. The other 82 left dependents who will receive from the industrial accident fund a total of \$454,310.64.

Comedian Jolson Predicts Pleasant New Music Fad

Harry and Al have always had friendly family arguments about music. Al rather likes the happy, noisy type, and Harry leans toward the song with a croon and swing that comes from way down south.

"Aw, I don't mean highbrow stuff," he explains carefully. "But, honest, I don't think negro melodies ever were intended to be shouted to the accompaniment of wild cawings or cowbells and kettledrums."

"You take 'Swanee River Moon', a song I'm singing now. It might have been a chant of the southern cotton fields, so soft and sympathetic is the undercurrent. It's not jazz at all—but a haunting, wistful melody, a direct follow-up of the songs that used to be part of the religious rites of native Africans."

"Incidentally, mark my prophecy, it's the next step and an upward one, too, in national popular music."
