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Well Pleased With Oil Property

George A. Gill, of the Black Diamond Iron and Oil Syndicate, returned this morning from Bakersfield, California, after making a short visit at his home and a survey of the property of the local company. Mrs. Gill, who made the trip with him, also returned this morning. Mr. Gill states that prospects are very bright and that it appears certain that the local company has a bigger proposition than they had at first expected. The big companies are bringing in fine wells on all sides and the oil is running better in grade than in many of the lower wells. The wells which have been bored have been clean and free from water and other troubles, and the companies are greatly pleased with the territory. Every indication is that there is a great bed of oil under the property belonging to the local organization, and the project is held to be a very safe one.

While away, Mr. Gill obtained bids for the installation of the necessary machinery for the boring of a well. He finds that the costs are now very reasonable, and that the local organization has sufficient funds on hand to install the equipment and start boring. A meeting of the board of directors will be held in the immediate future, and at that meeting it will be decided whether or not boring shall be started at once.

Auto Caravan to Stop Here Tonight

The auto caravan, which is making a tour of the state, will arrive here tonight on the way south. The caravan will stop over night and will continue on south in the morning. It will return in about two weeks and will stay considerable time here. The caravan is in reality a traveling automobile circus. There are about 35 outfits with a large number of people. There are Ford cars and Fordson tractors, trucks, trailers, special bodies, accessories, farm equipment, and practically everything pertaining to automobiles, tractors and their equipment and appliances.

Demonstrations will be held at frequent spots throughout the state. The caravan will be halted for several days at central points, and farmers and motorists will be able to see the apparatus operating under the most severe and critical tests. Plenty of amusement is being supplied by the caravan, which is liberally endowed with pup. One of the largest radio receiving and broadcasting stations on the coast is carried and furnishes the musical program. There are numerous other features which Roseburg people will have an opportunity to see upon the return of the caravan in about two weeks. The caravan will stay tonight at Laurelwood park, and will continue the trip south in the morning.
