The first part of the morning was given over to a Narcotic skit. The druggists have been greatly puzzled by a number of the phases of the narcotic laws and interpretation of many of these laws has been found necessary. The druggists obtained this information today in a unique and pleasing way. Hugh O'Conner, ex-deputy collector of internal revenue of the Narcotic division of California, was present, and introduced a short skit in which he was assisted by W. Bruce Phillip, secretary of the Alameda County Pharmaceutical association, and Frank S. Ward, executive secretary of the Oregon State Pharmaceutical association. Questions and answers were given in dialogue form, practically every problem being touched upon in the skit.

The morning session was well attended, and close attention was given the address made by S. F. Woewick, the Pacific coast manager of the Taylor Instrument company, who spoke on the subject of "Thermometers—How to Talk 'em and Sell 'em."

After lunch the convention took up the last business session, receiving the report of the nominating committee and electing and installing officers.

At the same time a meeting of the ladies was held for the purpose of organizing an active ladies' auxiliary to the state association. The organization of the auxiliary was under the direction of Mrs. W. Bruce Phillip, of California, who was the organizer of the California state auxiliary.

The program tonight will be given by the Traveling Men's auxiliary, and will consist of an informal dance.

#### CIVIL SERVICE EXAMINATIONS TO BE GIVEN AGAIN

The Civil Service Commission invites special attention to the fact that in examinations held recently in Eugene and other cities throughout the United States for computer, coast and geodetic survey, law clerk and typist, Bureau of Naturalization, Department of Labor; laboratory (chemical, physical, engineering), Departmental and Field Services; assistant observer in meteorology, Weather Bureau; radio inspector, Bureau of Navigation, Department of Commerce, applicants were not secured in the number desired, and that these examinations will be held again. The law clerk and typist, and the radio inspector examinations will be held on July 19; the others on August 9.

Persons interested in these or other examinations should apply to the Secretary of the U. S. Civil Service Board at the local post office for detailed information and application blanks.

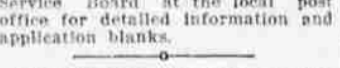
