SENSIBLE ADVICE TO AUTOMOBILE DRIVERS.

At this particular period of the year the public highways are crowded with all sorts of automobiles with a great variety of drivers. Everything from the cautious person who takes no chances to the "go-devil" that takes all kinds of chances and travels at a high rate of speed is found upon the highways. Accidents of a serious nature have occurred during the past few weeks which has caused Secretary Sam A. Koser to issue a timely warning to automobile drivers, urging them to use due caution during the congested period of travel which is now taxing the highways of the state and will continue throughout the summer months. Mr. Koser in his letter to the News-Review says:

"In view of the fact that during the months of July and August travel on the highways of Oregon is the heaviest, and, as a consequence, liability of accident from the operation of motor vehicles is greatly increased, I deem it an opportune time to direct attention to this condition and earnestly urge car drivers in your locality greater care in the operation of their cars. Caution on their part in this respect will help in a large measure in making the highways reasonably safe for travel, and continued attention to a few simple rules of the road will ultimately make travel comparatively safe at all times of the year."

"There is no time in the year when careful driving is not imperative. During the summer months congestion of traffic, which is greatly augmented by thousands of tourist cars from other states, necessitates closest attention to the observance of road laws, while winter months demand, in addition, extreme caution on the part of drivers on account of slippery pavements, obscured vision, etc. A little thought on the part of operators will minimize the danger and reduce the number of accidents, of which it is said the greater per centage is due to carelessness."

"To this end I am, therefore, taking the liberty of asking you, through the columns of your newspaper, to urge upon your readers who are car operators, the real need, especially during the current summer months, of the exercise of added caution and discretion, so that avoidable accidents, with consequent injuries and possible fatalities may be prevented."

"I feel quite sure that cooperation between the state press and the traffic division of the state department will tend to direct the attention of all drivers to the necessity of care on their part, and impress upon them their direct liability and risk by failure to observe certain rules of the roadway as well as impose upon other vehicles unnecessary dangers. Full cooperation will reduce to a great extent our record of violations in this state and prevent many accidents which are avoidable."
