BERRY GROWER ENJOINED

SALEM, July 15.—The Oregon Growers' Co-operative association on Thursday obtained an order in the Marion county circuit court restraining August Lentz, berry grower, from selling his crop of berries to persons or corporations other than the plaintiff. The association in its complaint alleged that it had entered into a contract with Mr. Lentz whereby the latter was to deliver to the plaintiff his entire yield of berries aggregating a value of approximately \$5,000. It was further alleged that Mr. Lentz had disposed of part of his berry crop to another concern and thereby violated his contract with the plaintiff.

Judge Bingham, in granting a temporary injunction, pending further consideration of the case, commented that it had been the rule of the courts generally to uphold contracts such as that entered into by Mr. Lentz.

GYPSIES REMAIN A PUZZLE

By Many, the Familiar Wanderers Are Believed to Have Originally Come From India.

The word gypsy is a contraction of Egyptian. When the nomads appeared in the British Isles, many centuries ago, their leaders called themselves "earls" folk. Only about 700,000 in number, the Balkan states and south Russia have most of them, but there are many in Egypt and among the Moors on the coasts of North Africa.

Who are they? To that question historians, anthropologists and just plain, curious people have tried to find an answer without success. Many believe that they are descendants of the lost ten tribes of Israel; still others think they are the children of Ham condemned to perpetual wanderings. They have been considered Spaniards, Assyrians and Egyptians, though they are different in body and mind from all of these.

The opinion generally held is that they are Hindus. They have the dark complexion, the same thin lips, straight and proportionate nose, brilliant eyes and white teeth of the Hindus. Their language, such of it that is not gypsy adaptation of the language of the people they live among, shows similarity to Hindu dialects. Besides, their habits and customs link them with the fortune telling, mystical habits of India.

GRASS GROWS ON BROADWAY

Fine Plot Flourishes Under Thousands of Feet in the Metropolis of the Nation.

There might be some towns where it would be difficult, but New Yorkers find it easy to hustle and get the grass grow under their feet. It is being done at least in one place in New York, near Broadway and Leonard street, remarks the New York Sun. At this point is a small drainage grating set into the sidewalk. Dust and dirt have settled in it almost to the level of the sidewalk, and in that little plot, less than two feet square, grass grows luxuriantly.

This is not ordinary mongrel grass that, like Topsoy, "just grows." A truck driver working for a cotton goods house in the neighborhood, with a leaning toward agriculture decided the soil under the grating would be fertile, and hit upon the idea of a grass plot. He purchased the seed adapted to the soil.

Next came the preparation of the ground. With a table knife borrowed from a restaurant the truck driver spaded the diminutive plot and planted his seeds. Soon the first green appeared. It has kept on growing steadily. It is true that the blades never get a chance to climb above the top of the grating, because they are kept worn down by hundreds of passing feet, but below there is a fine growth of rich, green grass.

Microbes That Defy Death

Though some microbes are very tough and can stand great extremes of heat and cold, the majority of them are easily killed if the right methods are used. But what puzzled scientists for many years was that "killed" microbes seemed to be able to come alive again!

You could kill them as dead as door nails, but in a very short space of time they would reappear in swarms and as lively as crickets.

Then a discovery was made. It was found that many microbes breed by means of seeds or spores, which are almost indestructible, save by fire.

Experiments made with spores show that they do not in the least mind undergoing a temperature of 400 degrees below freezing-point for many hours. Nor does it hurt them to be boiled! That is why such a disease as anthrax, the microbes of which produce spores, is so extremely difficult to stamp out—no ordinary means of disinfection is of the slightest use.

Simple Food for Fighters

Researches made by various scholars indicate that the heroes of Homer prepared their food with their own hands, the New York Herald remarks. In the happy simplicity of the Homeric ages the great heroes who dealt such terrible blows, leaving death and desolation behind them, when they reposed after their exploits, partook of a business dish of beans or a plate of honeyed lentils.

It may be difficult to imagine Diomedes in the act of peeling onions or Achilles washing cabbage. But although the wise Ulysses roasted, with his own hands, a sirloin of beef, vegetables occupied the most conspicuous places at all the great banquets of ancient Greece.

Never in Pairs

Badgers are rarely seen out of their burrows in the daytime, and this is the reason that, traveling over the western plains, one so seldom sees a badger, although their burrows are very numerous and every indication exists of the presence of these animals, says the American Forestry Magazine. They chiefly come forth at night, and it is the rarest thing to find a pair together. For some reason or other, the sexes pursue their avocations usually apart.

NEW YORK, July 14.—(United Press.)—Two distinct types of sport apparel are being worn with equal distinction at the summer beach resorts this year. There is the sport costume which consists of the slip-on sweater, with the white or striped skirt and the somewhat newer one-piece frock, which achieves very bright colors among which red, orange and yellow are the most prevalent.

These one-piece frocks are of the slip-on type with a narrow string belt. Usually they have collars and cuffs of white organdy although they may be round in neckline and entirely sleeveless with little capes thrown over the shoulders. Crepe de Chine makes some of the most interesting of these.

New Wrinkled Materials

Quite the newest and most unusual materials which have been shown in some time are the blistered silks and the heavily-wrinkled materials. If the predictions of Dame Fashion prove true, we will soon appear in gowns that look as though they had undergone a mustard plaster treatment. They will be as wrinkled as the gaudy prune. At present the blistered material is used mostly for the new short coat effects which are becoming so popular. As summer advances, we are growing weary of the fringed capes which have been so popular and the chic little box coat of silky or blistered silk offers a successful relief.

Paris has been using the short-coat for some time and has achieved remarkable results with them. Their old treatment of the collars and sleeves brings a distinction which the short-coat has never had before.

Sleeves may be large at the armpit

and end in cuffs that are like inverted funnels; they may be extremely wide and gathered into narrow wrist-bands or made in full kimono style. Collars may circle the neck in loose folds or be just snug little collar bands. Novelty stripes, embroidered clothes and blistered silks all tend to make these new jackets convincingly smart.

Organdy Evening Gowns

Organdy has always had a place in the heart of the American girl who is often at her best in this sheer, summery fabric. Of late years it has been considered too fluffy for daytime wear and has been crowded out by dark silk gowns, which women prefer to wear in spite of the heat. Now, however, it is offered as one of the latest materials for the summer evening gown and one is entirely surprised at what is being done with it in this line.

The organdy gown of today is not ruffled, tucked or lace-trimmed, but is used with one color over another and trimmed with self-toned flowers and peonies. Rose over lavender gives a two-toned effect that is lovely. Yellow over orange is also very attractive.

One of the prettiest combinations is shown in a frock of pale green, made over a foundation of old blue. The usage of these two colors gives a bronze effect. Twisted about the low waist is a sash composed of folds of deep lavender, dark green and bronze organdies.

These organdy gowns are at their best when made simply with the snug fitting bodice that is sleeveless and with quite a full skirt which may be peoced in scallops. The neck and armholes finish in peocing. Stockings should match the color of the underalls.

Election Contest Makes Much Work

PORTLAND, July 14.—From all indications there will not be much time for Ben Olcott and Charles Hall to do any campaigning for governor between the time the recount of the gubernatorial primary vote is completed and the date of the November election.

Jay Bowerman and Roy Shields of Salem, of counsel for Governor Olcott, have been in conference with W. S. U'Ren and other legal advisers of Senator Hall in an effort to smooth the way of legal difficulties and speed up the proceedings.

One of the main sources of Senator Hall's disturbed condition of mind, for instance, is the allegation that numerous voters who had been registered as democrats abandoned their registration on election day, swore their votes in, and voted for Olcott. It is the counter-assertion of the Olcott camp that, since party affiliations had sunk into second or third place at the time of the primary election, the mere fact that a democrat abandoned his former party registration did not of necessity mean an Olcott vote.

But beyond that rises question as to whether a voter has the legal and constitutional right to abandon his registered registration and switch to the other party affiliation by the Black & White.

This question and others of like legal and technical nature are to be discussed by the attorneys for the two principals in an effort to arrive at such stipulations that the legal phases of the controversy may be all thrashed out in advance when the

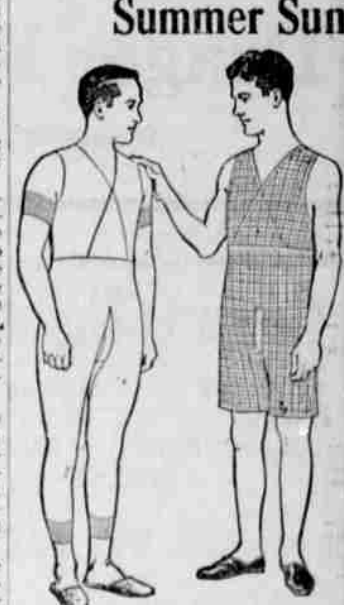
