RAT PEST IS MOST SERIOUS
Cause of Considerable Loss to Farmer and Poultryman—Plan to Eradicate Them.

Rats are multiplying in numbers every year in spite of all our rat-killing campaigns and propaganda. This pest is one of the most serious sources of loss to the farmer and poultryman. Every effort should be made to free the premises of them, and the fact that they seem to hold their own should only be the signal for redoubling our efforts against them.

SHADE NEEDED FOR POULTRY
Old Burlap Bags Stretched on Wire Netting Will Afford Satisfactory Protection.

They all need it—chicks, ducks, geese, ponies, everything in the poultry line from old hens to old turkey gobblers need some shade. The shade of bushes and shrubs, of orchard and grove, is the most attractive, but the shade of old burlap bags stretched on poultry netting tacked across a frame is a pleasant shelter from the intense rays of the sun to the feathered flock. Fresh water is another essential. Sun-warmed water is a breeder of cholera.

PLEA FOR BIRD PROTECTION
Feathered Creatures Alone Are Able to Wage Effective War on Insects That Destroy Crops.

It has been estimated, and no doubt conservatively, that insects injure the crops in the United States annually to the amount of more than three-quarters of a billion dollars. All will agree that if every portion of this loss could be avoided by the protection of bird life, it would be well worth the cost. Not only the farm crops and gardens suffer, but orchards, forests and shade trees are greatly injured by insect pests, a condition of which the people of Massachusetts are probably better aware than are the inhabitants of any other state.

There is a well-authenticated story of a Bavarian nobleman who made a fine piece of forest land a sanctuary so delightful to the feathered folk that when a scourge of destructive insects swept over the country, the summer dwellers protected his trees from devastating worms that stripped bare the neighboring forests. Similar occurrences on a smaller scale are perhaps not uncommon. Manifestly, from the standpoint of good citizenship, which calls for wise economic policies, bird protection as a subject for national legislation is deserving of most careful consideration; for these little friends of man, if they are encouraged and protected, render a very valuable service. Much wise legislation has been enacted, but there is need of more to make our bird friends secure.

Five Years Needed To Finish Roads

BEND, Or., July 16.—In five years all the highways in Oregon can be built with state money and federal aid. This does not mean that all will be built to standard but they will be good, usable roads.

Such was the statement made today by H. A. Booth, chairman of the state highway commission. In the next five years, with state and federal aid, the Roseburg highway will be pushed through and the small gaps here and there which exist throughout the state will be connected.
