Hawaiians Believe In Ancient Legend

HILLO, ISLAND OF HAWAII, T. H., July 15.—Recent volcanic activity in the ancient pits of Makapuu, Hanalei and Napaun, which have been "dead" since 1849, drained much of the lava that had made Halamaunau, the vast inner crater of the Kilaua volcano, so spectacular, and caused much fear that the lava would flow toward the sea and foundate the little villages of Kalapana, Panau and Puna.

The older generation of Hawaiians, however, entertained no such fear, for they remembered an ancient legend that had been made by Pele, goddess of the volcano, with Kama Puaa, the Hawaiian pig god, by which Pele promised that her lava would never flow through Hillo or Puna to the sea.

Pele and Kama Puaa had an argument and Kama Puaa went to Halamaunau, Pele's home, to fight it out. The god and goddess fought until Pele was overcome, and she pleaded for peace, according to the legend.

"We shall have peace if you promise never to allow your lava to flow through Hillo or Puna to the sea," Kama Puaa said. Pele consented and she has never broken her promise, fearing a return of the hated Kama Puaa, the legend said.

In 1880, when a lava flow was proceeding toward Hillo and threatened to destroy the city, the princess Ruth came from Honolulu here and, standing near the flow, reminded Pele of her promise and her danger from Kama Puaa. If she broke the agreement, the flow stopped immediately, according to the older Hawaiians.

On several other occasions Pele has sent her red hot rivers in the direction of Puna and Hillo but they have never reached the two places.

The last activity, resulting from an underground flow from Halamaunau that broke out at Makapuu, eleven miles down the great southeast rift that leads from Kilaua, has changed the appearance of the island, Hawaii's greatest scenic attraction, tremendously, according to persons now at the crater.

Although the pit of Kilaua shows no activity, volcano observers say that "she is not dead, only sleeping." "Soul Factory" Should Advertise

(By Associated Press.)

OMAHA, Neb., July 15.—A certain double page advertisement costs a chewing-gum manufacturer \$11,000. Rev. George Schmidt of New York today told the thirtieth international convention of the Walter League, an association of young people's societies of the Evangelical Lutheran Synodical Conference in an address recommending church advertising.

"To regain the mere investment he must sell 2,200,000 sticks of chewing gum, and a million people must chew gum for a day to pay for it," he continued.

"Certainly advertising must pay. Why, then, should we not do the same in a dignified way, and advertise the goods or the product we have to sell, attraction and personal peace, the bread of heaven, the water of life, the sweet and blessed balm of life?"

"It may startle some to think of 'selling' salvation, but after all that is what every preacher and personal worker does. To sell the product of your church, as much as any work is needed as to sell the product of any factory in your community. Too many churches establish their 'factory,' wait for 'customers,' and make no effort to distribute their products."

"There are about 40,000,000 men and women above ten years of age in the land who are outside the pale of the church. What can we do to reach them?"

"People who scoff at advertising the church and Christianity should remember that four of the greatest men in whom the foundations of Christianity were largely left were reporters or advertisers. They wrote the Gospels."

FRANCE WILL CELEBRATE ON SITE WHERE GERMAN DELEGATES SURRENDERED

(International News Service.) PARIS, July 15.—Lest battlefield visitors forget, the French government will celebrate Armistice Day, 1922, by the erection of an inscribed slab on the spot where Marshal Foch received the German delegation come to accept his armistice terms.

This spot, isolated, is in the middle of the forest of Compeigne, which marked at the time the terminus of the German and of the allied military railroads.

On the slab, which will resemble a tombstone, will be carved the words: "Here, the eleventh of November, 1918, succumbed the criminal pride of the German Empire vanquished by the free peoples whom it hoped to enslave."

Men Wanted

For service as railroad machinists, boiler-makers, blacksmiths, electricians, sheet metal workers, pipe fitters, copper-smiths, tinners, car inspectors, car repairs, helpers—all classes under strike conditions best explained by Chairman Ben W. Hooper of the United States Railroad Board, in his statement of July 1st reading as follows: "In this case the conflict is not between the employer and the oppressed employees."

The people of this country, through an act of congress, signed by President Wilson, established a tribunal to decide such disputes over wages and working conditions which are submitted to it in a proper manner. It is the decision of this tribunal against which the shop crafts are striking. Regardless of any question of the right of the men to strike the men who take the strikers' places are merely accepting the wages and working conditions prescribed by a government tribunal and are performing a public service. They are not accepting the wages and working conditions which an employer is trying to impose. For this reason, public sentiment and full government power will protect the men who remain in their position and new men who may come in."

Adequate provisions have been made for the full protection of all new employees, the same as old employees who have remained loyally at work.
