ART COLONY LURES RICH HEIRESS FROM PLACE IN SOCIETY

NEW YORK, July 18.—Automobiles, minks, "social position" and the like mean little to Mrs. Stanislaus Szukalski, formerly Miss Helen Walker, daughter of one of Chicago's wealthiest families.

She has gladly surrendered her place in the home of her father, Dr. J. S. Walker, of Chicago's famous "gold coast," to abide with her ultra-modern sculptor husband in a top-story flat of cramped dimensions in Greenwich Village, New York.

She, too, is an artist, and she met "Stan," as she calls him, at an art school here. She fell in love with him, long hair and all, and when the budding romance received the parental O. K., which it did, contrary to most fiction of a kindred trend, they were wed, and returned to the scenes amid which they were first mutually enamored.

Mrs. Szukalski has persistently eschewed the granting of interviews, explaining that she and her husband will refuse to be lionized by society, preferring their art instead, but the irrepressible joy of Stanislaus caused him to exclaim:

"Here we are, ready to work together and accomplish success. Helen is a delightful artist and we are very interested in our art. She is my perpetual inspiration."

"Mrs. 'Stan' attributes the success of her more recent art works to her husband in the same generous fashion in which he calls her his 'inspiration.'"

"Since Stan and I met in New York in the art school my work has improved," she asserted. "I exhibited my work in Chicago and I owe what praise I got to my husband. He is an exponent of the new school in art and sculpture. It is not our intention to lead a Bohemian life nor to be lionized in society. Here in this quiet studio, which I think is ideal, I am going to bury myself in my work."

Szukalski has been a resident of the artist colony at Greenwich Village for a number of years. A year ago he attracted the attention of Mrs. Harry Payne Whitney, who arranged to exhibit his work. From that point forward his popularity throughout the nation has developed.

HAUNTED BY CRIME VISIONS. HOMICIDE CLERK QUILTS JOB

NEW YORK, July 17.—Finishing 14 years of grueling work which brought him into daily and hourly contact with murder, Nathan Birchall Jr., resigning stenographer of the Homicide Bureau of New York county, declared recently his dreams were free from haunting visions of gory killings.

The man who has answered an average of 600 calls to the scene of violent death every year he served, says his iron nerve has kept him from being preyed upon by his gruesome experiences.

Practically every murder that has happened in Manhattan since 1908 has registered on Birchall's telephone. Awakened from sleep, at all hours of the night, called from the theaters and dinner parties by the news of sudden and mysterious death, he has seized his stenographer's notebook and rushed to the arena of crime.

"While I have answered about 600 calls yearly," he said today, "not more than half of these were properly within my domain, as accidental deaths hardly required my services. Only where ante-mortem statements of an assassin's victim, or of witnesses to slayings, or confessions of defendants before arraignment are needed has my work been required."

Perhaps one reason why his nerve-racking work has never affected his spirit when off duty is that Birchall is 32 and possesses a powerful will.

Hates to Quit.
"I really regret having to give up this work," he said. "But I am planning for my future in accepting a job as secretary to a municipal court judge in New York."

Among the recent murder cases in which Mr. Birchall was called on were the Elwell case, in which he declares there was comparatively little work for him, as little testimony of a direct nature was obtainable and no ante-mortem statement; the Hans Schmidt trunk murder mystery when he went to Sing Sing to take down the priest murderer's last story in the latter's final attempt to escape the chair; the Veith case, where a young man killed the false friend who assaulted his mother, and was acquitted, and the Varotta kidnapping and murder case, in which Roberto Raffaelo has just been sentenced to die.

Three causes are cited by Birchall for the recent murder wave. They are—1. Quarrels. 2. Hold-ups. 3. Boot-leg whiskey.

In spite of his proximity to the city's most horrible tragedies, Birchall has preserved his optimism and views the future with high hope.

Deutschland Sold at Public Auction.
LIVERPOOL, July 18.—The former German noted super-submarine, Deutschland, has been sold at Kellcock's saleroom, Liverpool, for £200 to Messrs. Robert Smith and Sons, Birkenhead. She will be dismantled and sold as scrap.

The Deutschland ran the blockade during the war and made two commercial voyages to the United States.
