Friction consumes power and develops heat and wear.

Sometimes friction is utilized. Concerning Primary Election System.

Oakland, Or., July 18, 1922.
Editor News-Review:

As the primary law is a subject of much discussion and is one of, if not the most important issue before the voters of this state, as well as others.

The primary is openly opposed by the stand-patters of both old parties, and vigorously upheld by progressives of the old parties.

Such men as President Harding, Secretary of War Weeks and Senator New openly and avowedly advocate the repeal of the primary and a return to the old convention system.

The aim of the democratic party is democracy.

The aim of the republican party is democracy.

The aim of the socialist party is democracy—all the parties past or present, had and still have a democratic aim. The nearer the government to the people, the more democracy.

When we abolish the primary and return to the convention, or amend the primary in a destructive way, we are taking the government farther from the people and are becoming less democratic.

The republican county central committee of Douglas county met and advocated a meeting of a number of voters of the different parties, advocating the principles of the respective political parties should be held not less than 45 days prior to the biennial state primary nominating election, at which time and place the respective delegates of the political parties shall congregate and adopt platforms or declarations of principles, and then and there endorse and recommend candidates for the nomination of the various county offices to be filled at the next state election, and select delegates to assemble at a later date and perform a similar service relative to district and state officers.

If the primary should be amended in such a way it would render it practically impotent, for the reason that the candidates who received the endorsement of the convention would have a decided advantage over all others, thereby killing the wholesome spirit of the primary.

To get the endorsement, all he or she would have to do would be to stand in good favor with more delegates than the other aspirants. If there were more than two aspirants it's probable he or she would have a minority endorsement.

I do not think the primary perfect, neither do I think it will ever be perfect, but I do think if it is amended, we should amend it in a way that will bring it nearer to the people.

The people of all political faiths pay taxes at the same rate of taxation, therefore I claim that the primary should be amended in such a way that it would admit all political parties to nominate the same as it does the democratic and republican parties at present.

Another constructive amendment to the primary would be one that gave all the political parties the right to promulgate a platform for their respective parties.

This could be brought about by a meeting of delegates elected by the people at the same time the candidates are nominated, the meeting to be held a month after the election. Then the delegates to the district and state conventions can be elected from their number to meet at a later date and with the assistance of the candidates and leaders each convention can adopt its platform at the same time we are bringing the primary nearer to the people.

If we want to keep the primary representative of the people, we must have no convention prior to the nominating election. If we do, you'll see delegates riding on railroad passes as they did in the days of the convention system.
