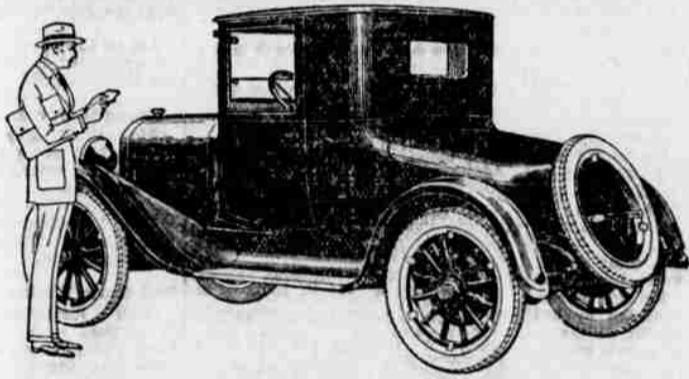

# KLAN ISSUE IN TEXAS ELECTION

### Feeling Runs High Over Coming Primary Which Will Test Strength of Organization.

## SIX ARE FOR SENATOR

Six Prominent Men Seek Office of U. S. Senator, and Two Champion Klan With Three Strongly Opposed to Organization.

DALLAS, Texas, July 22. (United Press.)—Beret of the generation-old cause of political battle—prohibition—Texas is taking its campaign stimulants from the Ku Klux Klan and anti-klan battle with a farm-labor coalition chaser.

The issue will be partially settled at today's first 1922 democratic primary. The lines have been closely drawn on this issue in the senatorial campaign, where six candidates are in the field. The two candidates receiving the highest number of votes will enter the run-off primary, two weeks hence, unless the unexpected happens and one candidate records a majority of votes. As the senatorial race is about evenly divided between pro-klan and anti-klan, the second primary will undoubtedly find this question the sole battle-cry.

In the gubernatorial race, where four names will appear on the ballot, the klan does not seem to be so important a factor. Governor Neff is out for re-election and seldom, if ever, has a candidate for the governorship for a second term received serious opposition and never has one been defeated under the primary law. Harry T. Warner, Paris, newspaperman and avowed opponent of the klan, has conducted a strenuous campaign through his paper, the Paris Morning News. Fred S. Rogers, Bonham, lawyer, backed by the farmer-labor-non-partisan coalition, and W. W. King, restaurant owner and farmer of Bronson, are the other gubernatorial candidates.

Six candidates, including the venerable senator himself, are seeking the toga of Charles A. Culberson, which he has held for many years.

There are too many divisions in the state to determine entirely the outcome of tomorrow's election, but Texas' primary law requires majority nomination and whatever doubt remains as to the klan's strength, more than likely will be cleared up at the second primary on August 5. Senator Culberson announced early in his campaign that he was unalterably opposed to the klan.

Former Congressman Robert L. Henry, of Waco, declared he was a member of the organization and has solicited votes on that basis.

Cullen E. Thomas, Dallas, lawyer, said "the klan must die or else be reorganized along different lines." Earle B. Mayfield, Meridian, member of the Texas Highway commission, though remaining silent on the klan issue, has been recognized as one of the adherents to its principles and has pleaded for "100 per cent Americanism" from the stump throughout his campaign.

Clarence Ousley, former assistant secretary of agriculture, has opposed the klan. He is expected to draw much of the support that had been pledged to the late Congressman Lucian W. Parrish, who was killed in an automobile accident shortly after he started his campaign for the senatorial office. Both men endorsed the action of congress in voting an emergency tariff on wool, mohair, beef and hides.

In the San Antonio district, now represented in congress by Harry Wurzbach, republican, a field of four are seeking opportunity to oppose Wurzbach for re-election, and the contest has been spirited.

Almost every local candidate throughout the state has based his campaign on the Ku Klux Klan issue.

## Not All Sharks Are Man-Eaters.

Not all sharks are man-eaters. Most persons who have fallen victim to sharks have been eaten merely because they happened to be at hand. J. C. Bell of the American museum examined the contents of the stomachs of more than thirty tiger sharks.

Most of the sharks were from nine to twelve feet long, and 76 per cent of them had been eating such creatures as sea turtles, other sharks and large rays and porpoises. Thirty-eight per cent had eaten a variety of smaller creatures—crabs, horseshoe crabs, mackerel, shad and other fish—and one had eaten a water bird. Six per cent, probably in their role of scavengers, had swallowed the bones of domestic animals; one shark contained, among other material, beef bones and hair, and a second, which landed on the deck still alive, vomited several small mammal bones, among which were the leg bones of three sheep.

Ordinary sharks constituted the largest single item of diet for the tiger sharks that Mc. Bell examined.

## BITTER DISPUTE TO BE ARBITRATED
