Chinese General Presents X-ray Machine to Mission for Treating Wounded Men

PAOTINGFU, China, July 22.—A 100 X-ray machine has been presented to the Taylor Memorial Presbyterian hospital by General Wu Pei-fu of the American doctors and men in the hospital are doing for men wounded in the China civil

the missionary doctors and nurses working night and day to meet needs for hundreds of serious cases are being brought to the hospital. The doors of the institution open to the wounded of both sides, regardless of whether they fell in the ranks of General Wu Pei-fu or Marshal Chang Tso-lin.

The local military authorities have converted three school buildings into hospitals staffed with trained Chinese physicians. The soldiers prefer the military hospital. General Feng Yu, the famous Christian general, in a special dispatch to the head of the hospital here asking that his wounded be placed in the Taylor Memorial hospital.

Women Assist Doctors.

During the last two weeks there have been more than 100 X-ray examinations made, and with equipment limited to one machine and two American assistants, with Chinese assistants, this has meant fast work. Sixty beds in the hospital were filled, and the overflow patients are being cared for in school buildings. Missionaries of the Presbyterian, American Board and Salvation Army, anxious to help, under the making of several hundred dresses. Chinese women under direction of the American women assisted.

S. O. S. was sent to Peking, and additional American nurses arrived in Paotingfu, while volunteer workers, including many school boys, were placed on duty.

General Wu Pei-fu and his staff made an inspection of the hospital and overflow buildings to the Taylor Memorial hospital. With a kindly smile and a most sympathetic manner, General Wu thanked his men, thanked them for

their service and urged them to be brave, for they would be well shortly. His visit greatly cheered up "the boys."

General Wu Investigates.

So impressed was General Wu with the X-ray machine that he made investigations. He found that the machine was borrowed from a Peking hospital and that the local hospital needed a similar instrument very badly, but lacked the funds to purchase one.

He spent several hours watching the workings of the X-ray and was fascinated. There were many interesting cases, and Wu enjoyed seeing the doctors locate the bullets. Upon departure he promised the hospital \$6000 to purchase a new instrument.

The hospital was built in honor of Dr. George Yardly Taylor, a Princeton university graduate, who was killed and his original hospital and dispensary destroyed in 1900 by a Boxer mob. The first medical work in Paotingfu was opened in 1894 by Dr. Taylor and Dr. B. C. Atterbury.

Hospital Is Opened.

Following the terrible Boxer days Dr. Charles Lewis reopened medical work in a little street chapel, where work was carried on during the construction of a hospital building, which cost \$5,500, a gift of Dr. Taylor's classmates, of Princeton.

The work has grown rapidly, and the little hospital built by Dr. Taylor and his classmates has grown and developed into a modern plant. There is an American and Chinese staff, which includes Dr. Tu, a charming "new woman" of China, who is a graduate of the China Medical College for Women.

A civil war in China may seem a far-away, unimportant event to America, but any internal disturbance greatly affects the American business people living in the interior cities and the missionaries who are risking their lives in service. The Taylor Memorial hospital, manned by Americans and financed by American money, is playing an important part in this civil war. And this hospital is only one of many missionary institutions flying the American flag, which is doing its "best."

"Subby" Jumped at Wrong Time

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., July 22 (Associated Press).—Because he forgot to look before he jumped, "Subby," the famous trained dog of Yuba City, is dead.

"Subby" was too trustful of his human friends. Until a few days ago he had a comfortable existence in the harbor shop of F. Taylor. He entertained the patrons while they waited for a chair, was a valuable adjunct to the barber, and last year's Literary Digest.

After a year in captivity he had been assured that there were no more books in the bait held out to him. He would jump for a hook in the fingers above the water, strike it home every time, and then he made too much of a jump and landed on the floor. A smart slap, but it never seemed to hurt him. Friendly hands tried to put him back into the bowl. He became so accustomed to being picked up, and even con-

sent to let Taylor pick him up and take him out of the water a few seconds at a time.

A few days ago Subby was found stiff and stark on the floor. He had evidently chosen an early morning hour to jump at a fly which hovered above his abode, and had shot clear out of his bowl onto the floor. But there were no friendly hands to put him back in the bowl again.

Of course, it might have been suicide, but there was no motive. Hence it is probable that the coroner's jury will return a verdict of drowning in the air.

CLAIM OFFICERS PROTECT RING

Reedsport Is Aroused Over Charges Made By Man Arrested For Disorder.

OFFICERS MAKE DENIAL

Say That Charges Made Public Through Newspaper Are Biased and That No Evidence Is at Hand to Prove the Claims.

Reedsport is considerably aroused over charges made by Addison Cook, through the Reedsport Courier, that the officers of that place are standing in with an alleged liquor ring there. It is evident that the article appearing in that paper has aroused considerable feeling, and Marshal Schulte this morning called the News-Review by telephone to refute some of the statements which have been circulated through the county in connection with the case. The article appearing in the Courier follows:

"A very interesting trial has been going on in the city this week growing out of the arrest of Addison Cook, local painter and paper hanger, who was arrested last Saturday night between the hours of 8 and 9 o'clock in the evening by Marshal Schulte, charged with abusing language in a public street of the city of Reedsport where the peace and quiet of the vicinity was disturbed. The trial has developed in a general investigation of the bootlegging activities of Reedsport which it is claimed has been going on in the city for the last year under the protection of the officers. Marshal F. C. Schulte and Constable J. S. Connolly.

"The two officers have been accused by Cook of protecting a certain ring of illicit sellers of liquor who have been selling liquor in Reedsport and vicinity at large prices under their protection, and have been receiving, it is claimed, \$5 for every gallon sold.

"A great number of witnesses have been examined and their testimony has been taken and made a matter of public record. Mrs. W. G. Benson, acting as city reporter.

"The two officers mentioned, have engaged John C. Kendall, of Marshfield, to assist City Attorney J. H. Napier in their defense of the accusations made against them. Attorney J. H. Austin is conducting the defense of the defendant, Mr. Cook.

"The case has occupied the attention of City Recorder W. G. Benson, before whom it is being tried for the last four days, and as we go to press, the case was adjourned until 7:30 p. m. Thursday, and may continue for several days yet.

"The case has attracted much attention during the week and the matter of the guilt or innocence of the defendant of the crime charged has been to a great extent lost sight of and more attention being paid to who are implicated in what is charged to be a liquor ring operating here under the protection of the local officers before mentioned."

The article published in the Courier emanates from interested sources and so far as it pertains to the charges that officers are protecting bootleggers, is maliciously false, Mr. Schulte says.

"Attorney Austin, who is the attorney for Cook, is interested in the Courier," Mr. Schulte says, "and is using this influence to help his case, if possible. There have been charges made by Mr. Cook, but there has been no evidence introduced. A number of unsubstantiated statements have been made, and rumors started, but nothing has been put in to evidence to back up these statements.

"The 'ring' would like to get something on the officers, and is trying to do so. Fifteen witnesses have been called, four of them being officers. Seven or eight others who were called, have been arrested at odd times by me and here a grudge which they are trying to even. The charges that we are protecting bootleggers are absolutely false and no evidence can be found to substantiate the claims."
