

Hungry Russian Peasants Quickly Grind and Cook Corn Brought Into Famine Zone by American Workers



These two pictures, taken in the famine region of Russia, give a fragmentary idea of the way the American corn, provided by the appropriation of Congress last winter, is being received and how quickly it brings a look of health into the faces of the unfortunate. This corn has reached thousands of villages far from the railway lines. When the first American Relief Administration workers arrived at some of the villages in the amara region the villagers knelt and thanked them as deliverers. As the relief work continues with the

backbone of the famine broken, it is estimated that more than 5,000,000 children are being fed, in addition to 5,000,000 adults on corn diet, and 250,000 in the soup lines. The corn is provided by Congressional appropriation. The rest is from private gifts of the American people. In addition to the feeding work the medical department of the A. R. A. is fighting existing epidemics and preventing others by educating the people in improved sanitation and hygiene, introducing bathhouses in many cities, assisting established hospitals and providing emergency centers for treatment. For this work Congress

gave \$4,000,000 of surplus army medical supplies, and the American Red Cross \$3,400,000.

The larger of the two pictures above shows former Governor Goodrich, of Indiana, measuring out some of the first consignment of American corn to reach an isolated Russian village. The peasants who have already received their allotment are seen with their sacks filled. Governor Goodrich in this picture is tilting the measure laden with "Amerikanski maize"—the Russian name for the corn and an expression which is spoken almost with reverence by the peasants.

In the smaller of the pictures one of the peasants is seen grinding his allotment of corn, in order that he and his family may lose no time in cooking it. The method of grinding is a primitive one and it is probable that few Americans of the present generation have seen such operations conducted, except for exhibition purposes. However, it is the only method which these peasants know.

Crashoppers Serve as Food for Stranded Florida Flyer

Let White Meets Hardships When Forced to Land in Florida Everglades.

MIAMI, Fla., July 24.—Losing his sense of direction while flying 4,000 feet in the air, Cadet R. A. White was forced to alight when his gas tank went dry.
In a plane, in which he was flying to Okeechobee City, Florida, to attend a field descended in the Florida Everglades, miles from civilization, two days he marched through the swamps, often in mud knee-deep, he was making many detours to avoid alligators and snakes.
Driven to desperation by hunger, flyer was compelled to subsist on crashoppers until finally found by a lone Indian boy who guided him to civilization.
While he was undergoing these experiences airplanes from Carlstrom, Fla., Arcadia, Florida and Montgomery, Alabama, circled over the territory in which he was believed to be, but the Everglades and swampy land from above. They finally found him after he had been rescued while being taken in an automobile from the Carson cattle ranch to the Imukalee.
Although ill from drinking swamp water and his face swollen by mosquito

to bites, he remained in the field hospital only one day, then declared his intention of making another practice flight from Carlstrom Field to Okeechobee City and return.
Cadet White's home is in Pritchett, Texas.

Pauline was acquitted of complicity in the murder, although she admitted she helped her mother pack the body of the slain Basserabo in a trunk and ship it to Nancy. On the grounds that there is a mystery which neither she nor Pauline have as yet divulged, Madame Basserabo has appealed for a new trial.

FEE CHARGED VISITORS TO MUSEUMS IN FRANCE

PARIS, July 24.—Enforcement of a new regulation requiring the payment of entrance fees to all museums and places of historic interest in France begins this month. The fee will be fifty centimes or one franc, according to the importance of the national monument or collection. The special rates will be made subscribers, students, wounded soldiers, members of large families and similar privileged classes.

A Business Motive Power

The time must come when all businesses will consider the advisability of advertising in the same spirit that a manufacturer ponders over the advisability of adopting a new machine. One does not install a piece of labor-saving mechanism because it suits his fancy; but because the efficiency of the business requires it.
