Opposes Grange Income Tax Bill

There are no less than eight adequate reasons why the voter of Oregon should turn down the proposed income tax bill, initiated by the state Grange, when they deal with it at the general election in November, according to the negative argument on the measure which was filed with the secretary of state by W. Lair Thompson, of Portland.

These he sets forth as follows: It will immediately stop the business development of the state.

The burden of taxation will be increased by the bill, without relief to property now taxed.

The proposed law places the heaviest burden on taxpayers residing in the outlying counties and practically denies court redress to some.

Publicity of private incomes whether business or personal and the personal and intimate details of one's business is un-American and unbearable to a free people.

It would take the provision you made for your widow and orphans and discourage thrift.

Payments under the soldier's bonus law would be taxed.

The proposed law penalizes aid from parent to child.

It would discourage home building and discriminate against individuals and partnerships.

"The proposed law is framed to give additional incentive to men of wealth, so necessary to our state development, to take themselves and their needed wealth from Oregon immediately," Mr. Thompson insists.

"Our men of wealth have a proportion of their money invested in business, but usually the greater proportion is invested in securities that follow the person. Not only will this law drive them and their wealth out of the state, but by removing between the November election and the end of the year they will in large measure escape taxation for 1922."

Says Booze Is Hard to Find

ATLANTA, Ga., July 28.—"Real liquor for beverage purposes is practically unavailable; the bootlegger market is diminishing daily because of universal fear of their poisonous product, the home-brewed is waning and moonshiners are on the run." These statements are made by Federal Prohibition Commissioner Hayes in a letter to Fred D. Dismuke, federal prohibition director for Georgia, congratulating him on the strict enforcement of prohibition in this state.

The prohibition commissioner attributes these results to "cutting off sources of supply, co-operation on the part of enforcement agencies of every character, backed by a crystallized public sentiment and aroused press." He also gives credit to helpful cartoonists, more convictions by juries and stiffer sentences by courts and to action by chambers of commerce, Rotary clubs, Kiwanis clubs and similar organizations.

The letter followed the last report of the federal agents in Georgia showing an increase of 40 per cent in all lines of enforcement activity.

"The Eighteenth Amendment is being enforced to an extent greater than ever dreamed possible," Commissioner Hayes wrote, "and it is a pleasure to commend the progress that is being made in your state through your excellent corps of officers."

Ford Company Making Glass

DETROIT, July 28. (A. P.)—Henry Ford has launched upon a new enterprise, that of glass making.

The manufacturer has established here and begun to operate a plant that will produce glass for automobile windshields. It is said to be the first plant in the country designed especially for making of windshields.

The Ford slogan, "Keep things moving," is playing a large part in the new methods introduced by the manufacturer in his latest field of endeavor. A continuous conveyor system makes it possible for the glass to be kept continually moving from the time it leaves the furnace to build form until it becomes a polished windshield.

The hot glass is drawn from the furnace and passes under a roller that gives it width and thickness, and then upon a moving conveyor that carries it 154 feet through a gradually cooling furnace. At the end it is cut and placed on another conveyor that carries it through the stages of grinding and polishing, after which it is ready for use.
