State Highway Commissioner Here

State Highway Commissioner R. A. Booth spent a short time in Roseburg this morning conferring with the county court regarding the Winchester highway bridge. As the county is to pay a share of this expense, the court is being consulted before the commission allows the contract, the bids having been received at the last meeting. Mr. Booth placed the figures before the court, the county court agreeing to accept the highway commission's decision in the matter. Mr. Booth went north with the court for an inspection of the new detour and to discuss road matters with them.

Want Witnesses in Klan Probe

MEDFORD, July 27.—Assistant Attorney General Liljeqvist today issued a request "that any and all persons having information regarding the night riding operations in Jackson county, come before the special session of the grand jury and give testimony" in order that the grand jury may receive all the information possible.

The grand jury is today hearing testimony relative to the "hanging" of Henry Johnson, colored, of Jacksonville, the last victim of the night riders. Among the witnesses called are Edison Marshall, short story writer; Mayor Charles E. Gates; Attorney R. E. Landis, who has a suit for \$25,000 for alleged slander pending against the Ku Klux Klan; O. D. Frazier, alleged secretary of the local Klan chapter; A. E. Fleming, Alex. Norris, Bert Moses, all residents of Jacksonville; Paul York, a Jacksonville youth who was with Johnson when he was "tossed," but freed after a lecture; and Mrs. Herbert K. Hanna of Jacksonville.

Raymond Reter testified today and described the initiations of March 4, discussed at great length by residents of the Rogue River Valley. Reter was accused of violating oaths "the penalty of which is death," when he resented the imputation made on the floor of the lodge that a warm friend was a Catholic. Reter told the grand jury Mayor Gates made a speech in his behalf when his case was under consideration for violation of "vows." Reter also told of the sentence of the defunct officer, his own fervid reply, and leaving the hall in a huff. Later, with his friend, he faced "latter's" accuser on the streets of this city, and the matter was adjourned at a stormy session on the street.

Tom Ward, the special investigator for the department of justice, at Portland, who has been collecting

evidence of the Klan doings about Medford for some time and who is working in conjunction with attorney general's office in the presentation of these matters before the grand jury, is at Medford assisting Liljeqvist. The latter believes that it may be possible to complete his investigations late Saturday though it may be that the work will run over into the coming week.

COLORED WITNESS FAILS TO AGREE

MEDFORD, July 28.—Arthur Burr, colored, first victim of the night riders in Jackson county, whose actions are now being investigated by the grand jury, was listed among the missing today. Burr left Medford, California, in time to reach Medford at 6 this morning, where he is wanted as a witness. Federal agents met the train, but Burr was not aboard. The jury today heard the evidence dealing with the hanging of Johnson, of Jacksonville. The grand jury will probably adjourn Saturday.
