Oregon Banks Have Heavy Resources

SALEM, Ore., July 29.—The total resources of all banks in Oregon on June 30, 1922, was \$290,737,197.59—a net decrease of \$7,907,116.49 as compared with June 30, 1921, according to figures made public here this afternoon by Frank C. Bramwell, state superintendent of banks.

On the same date, Mr. Bramwell's statement shows, the resources of Portland banks were \$153,225,994.66, this being a decrease of \$245,594.84 as compared with June 30, 1921.

Total resources of state, savings, private and foreign banks and trust companies on June 30 of this year were \$116,956,267.48, according to the statement. The net decrease of one year was given as \$6,864,168.91.

National banks of the state on June 30 of the present year showed resources totalling \$174,670,930.11, according to Mr. Bramwell and, during the year, the decrease was \$142,948.48.

While decreases are shown in total resources of the banks, an increase is shown in the total deposits and this, Mr. Bramwell explained, is a favorable indication. On June 30 of the present year the deposits totaled \$329,658,494.80, while they were but \$233,455,413.42 one year previous.

The decrease in resources, it was explained, is due to general deflation and business depression found generally over the country.

The report also shows that Oregonians borrowed far less money up to June, 1922, than they had one year earlier. In 1921 \$16,487,393.82 was out, while the 1922 report shows but \$6,970,667.95.
