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Winchester Bridge Contract Is Let

SALEM, Aug. 1.—The state highway commission Saturday announced that it had awarded the contract for the construction of a concrete arch bridge across the North Umpqua river on the Pacific highway near Winchester, Douglas county, to H. E. Doering, of Portland. The bridge will consist of seven arches and will approximately be 1,000 feet in length. The roadbed will be 20 feet wide and the height of the floor above the average water is 70 feet. The structure will cost \$125,000. The county, state and government will share in the cost of the bridge.

Black Cat Bad Luck For K.K.K.

MEDFORD, July 31.—Developments in the resumption in the grand jury probe of the night-riding outrages today was the return to the city of J. P. Bray, chiropractor and minister, one of the "lost witnesses," also the appearance of Dwight L. Vimont, former postal employee, for testimony. Subpoenas have been out a week, for both men, who are wanted in connection with the J. E. Hale outrage. Dr. Bray telephoned this office this morning, that he has been in the vicinity of Bend, Oregon, and that the first he knew he was wanted was Saturday when he saw the Portland papers. He came at once, driving the 185 miles, to arrive here Sunday. Dr. Bray said he had no intention of evading anything, and expressed a willingness to appear before the inquisitorial body. Vimont has been working on a survey crew 26 miles from this city.

The grand jury heard testimony this morning, on the Hale, Johnson and Burr cases, gathering up the loose ends of the mass of evidence presented to them.

Burr Tells Story. Arthur Burr, the colored boot-black, who was the "victim" of the first "hanging expedition," in the local uplift movement, was the first witness. Burr is supposed to have testified to his experiences from the time he finished his county jail term for bootlegging, till he sped away from his captors in a southerly direction, with the parting admonition to run. He has regained some of his nerve, since Friday.

Inspector of Detectives Tackaberry and Phillips, of Portland arrived this morning to testify before the grand jury. It is said they will testify relative to their search of a room in the Multnomah hotel at Portland occupied by Hale, at the behest of a local member of the Ku Klux Klan who has been before the police. This may be a link of evidence, showing a connection between the local organization and the state Klan organization. What the police officials were looking for has not been divulged, but it is supposed they were after information relative to what was going on in this section, relative to any investigation. The incident occurred in April.

Black Cat Crosses Trail

It is also said that when Alex Norris and his son-in-law Goodie, of Jacksonville, were driving home from an auto trip to Ashland, that terminated in Henry Johnson and Paul York, their companion, being "hanged" and lectured, that a black cat omen of bad luck the world over—ran across the road, and one of the party remarked that "we are going to have bad luck." It is also said that evidence was introduced to show that one of the masked men had made a mask out of a piece of his shirt tail. It is supposed that testimony was offered to show that the parents of young Paul York were informed just before he left for Ashland, "that if this boy falls down and breaks his leg, we'll not be responsible. The above incidents have been sources of Jacksonville talk and surmise ever since the "hanging" and have been matters of common knowledge.

U. of O. Assemblies To Be Broadcasted

EUGENE, August 1.—Plans for broadcasting throughout the northwest the speeches of assembly speakers at the University of Oregon and musical concerts held by the associated students of the university when the regular term begins next fall were made known yesterday by Garrett Lewis, the only commercial radio operator in Eugene, who has a sending station at his home at 1274 Emerald

street which has been copied in Canada and four miles north of the Mexican border. Mr. Garrett, who is a university student and who is connected with the Emerald radio station last spring on the campus, has not yet discussed the matter with the university authorities, but he believes there will be no difficulty in obtaining permission to increase the assembly audience a thousand-fold. Last spring the university students voted to impose upon themselves a quarterly fee which would be used in paying the expenses of the most talented singers and musicians in the country and for this reason it is expected that the assembly musical bookings will include the services of many noted musicians. Also several times during each term of the scholastic year speakers of national prominence appear to address the students and the broadcasting station planned by Mr. Lewis will send these speeches to all parts of the northwest.

Broadcasting of university concerts and assembly talks as planned by Mr. Lewis will not necessitate any great amount of work or expense on his part and his tentative plans can be realized in a few hours simply by constructing a loop from his station to the assembly platform. Mr. Lewis has a ten-watt station and it is equipped with many contrivances which make it one of the best of its kind on the coast. Mr. Lewis during the war was a naval operator and received extensive training in the Harvard radio school.

There are over 200 receiving stations in Eugene at present and local radio men estimate that before the winter is over, there will be 1,000 radio phones receiving concert matter here. It was pointed out that not only is there very little interest taken in radio work during the summer months, but static conditions are not always favorable during warm weather. Concert work is far better during cold weather when the atmosphere is chilly, say local operators.

Mr. Lewis' station has an aerial strung on a 65-foot pole and the antenna has a six-wire string with a nine-foot cage, which, according to the operator, has proved very efficient. This is the only cage in Eugene for transmitting purposes. Both the damp and undamped systems of transmission are used.

There are nine radio districts in the United States and the station erected by Mr. Lewis has been heard in six of these. This will mean that matter sent out by the local station will have an audience which at present cannot be estimated. For communication purposes, Mr. Lewis has been assigned the call 7 OZ, and his sending call is KDJZ.
