Lack of Home Life For Children Is Cause of Crime, Famous Woman Says

Children Should Not Become Bread Earners Too Early Atlanta Woman Asserts

(International News Service.)

ATLANTA, Ga., Aug. 1.—The modern woman's race for money has caused present criminal conditions and social problems, because children now do not know what home is.

So says Mrs. Grace Kirkland, herself a physician, politician, poet, editor, social worker, stenographer, lecturer and more recently a lawyer—a participant in about all the chief businesses in which man engages.

"The mother is away, earning a living," she says. "The children grow up without training and themselves become bread earners before they are old enough to be out of the play stage. The result is crime. The children have not been taught at home."

Although active for years in several professions Mrs. Kirkland is not an enthusiast on the question of professions for women. Women ought to stay in the home, she believes.

Mrs. Kirkland recently was admitted to the bar. Known to hundreds of her former patients as a kindly physician, to whom the picture of her pleading the cause of criminals is an anomaly, she soon is to be sworn in as a full-fledged attorney.

"Women Should Study Medicine."

Although advocating home for the woman, she says she believes all women should study medicine. "I think all women should study medicine, at least enough to enable them to take care of their health and that of their children," she said. "And they will find it interesting, too. There is not a branch of science which medicine does not deal with, and that is more than we can say even for literature."

She believes that there is a promising field for women in surgery. "Oh yes, women have plenty of nerve for surgery. It's the easiest branch of medicine, and the objections some women think they would have to wielding the surgeon's knife disappear in actual practice."

Mrs. Kirkland was editorial writer from 1910 to 1913 for a chain of western daily newspapers, coming to Georgia in 1913 to be editor of the official journal of the Farmer's Union.

DISCREPANCIES ARE CHARGED BY SPORTSMEN

KLAMATH FALLS, Aug. 1.—Facts and figures purporting to show discrepancies in the annual report of the state game warden were presented at the meeting of the Klamath Sportsmen's association in the chamber of commerce last night. The meeting was marked by warm statements relating to the alleged incompetency of the state game commission. The resignation of the members retiring from the executive board was tendered and accepted after much discussion during which reconsideration of the move was urged.

The outstanding discrepancy, as stated by Secretary L. J. Bean, was that the annual report of the state game warden showed that 2,507,000 fish were hatched and 2,158,256 liberated in Klamath county during 1921, whereas the figures of Lloyd M. Tucker, hatchery superintendent for Klamath county, showed that 2,270,500 were hatched and 1,421,000 liberated, he said. This discrepancy, Bean asserted, did not include 613,000 which, he said, were a total loss due to having been liberated in a dirt pond while the egg sacs were still attached.

Incompetency of commission employees was shown, Bean said, through unnecessary losses. As an example, he pointed out, 1,300,000 eggs were hatched at Spencer creek of which only 550,000 lived.
