PRICES OF HAM GO DOWN.

CHICAGO, Aug. 3.—Wholesale prices of ham have gone down 15 to 20 per cent in the last 30 days, and hams are relatively cheap compared with other foods, according to Edward Morris, president of Morris & Co.

He said today that consumers so far have failed to take advantage of the decrease in cost.

LIVE WIRE KILLS WORKER.

ALBANY, Aug. 2.—Sigert Myers, 26, lineman for the Mountain States Power company, was electrocuted here this afternoon while working in the auxiliary power plant. Myers touched a wire carrying 2300 volts.

Myers fell to a rubber mat on the power station floor. He crawled a few feet and collapsed. Help was summoned immediately and a pulmonologist obtained from the fire department.

Myers has lived here for two years and had been in the employ of the Mountain States Power company. He is survived by his widow and 2 year old son.

PRISONERS BUY UNIFORM FOR COP THEY RAZED.

UPPER HUDSON REGION MECCA FOR TOURISTS.

ALBANY, Aug. 4.—Albany and the upper Hudson river region is becoming the Mecca for tourists from all parts of the United States and Canada. Thousands of automobile boat and hiking parties pass through here daily to visit points of interest in this section.

Reports received here from the northern part of the state are to the effect that this will be a banner year for the resorts in the Adirondacks. One of the most noticeable changes from other years is the great number of girl-hikers in knickers on their way to the mountains. Many of the young women say it is just a "nice walk" from New York city to Albany and thence to the woods.

FRENCH ACTOR WOUNDED DURING PLAY IN LILLE.

LILLE, France, Aug. 4. (I. N. S.)—Less poignant because accidental, but no less a shock to the audience, a tragedy similar to that in "Pagliacci" was enacted at a local theater.

The play being presented was a melodrama in which a woman shoots a dancing partner who has been untrue to her.

No one knows how it came about that loaded cartridges were substituted for the blanks.

When the actress who played the betrayed woman pulled the trigger her colleague crumpled up all too naturally.

Everyone applauded heartily, even when the announcement came that "the comedy is finished." The actor, M. Rene Renaud, is in a Lille hospital, seriously wounded.

KANSAS—(I. N. S.) A C B BY KENNETH HARRIS.

(International News Service.) KANSAS CITY, Mo., Aug. 4.—With in a period of two years juvenile delinquency among girls has increased 29 per cent, according to Judge E. E. Porterfield, of the Kansas city juvenile court. This perceptible increase can be attributed directly to the lure of bright lights and the gay mothers of today, the judge declared.

"For the first time in the history of this court I have observed that

the girls are going back on me," Judge Porterfield explained. I am shocked. The girls of today are far too independent for their own benefit. For some inexplicable reason the majority among the youths of today—boys and girls—refuse to listen to the advice given by their elders.

"The mothers who are constantly seeking entertainments outside of the home, and those who make a practice of leaving their broods to the care of a trained nurse are partially responsible for the utter disregard with which girls are treating the moral code."

Historical data has it that there was once a period when little girls "were made of sugar and spice and everything nice." But those days are pronouncedly passe now, court attendants declare.

Young girls are showing a marked tendency to learn early the ways of dangerous gaiety, nightly revels away from the home and numerous unconventional things, according to a woman probation officer. A loose moral view point is largely to blame, she said. The future of society is at stake, and the courts should immediately adopt strenuous methods to curb these evils, she declared.

TOKIO STARTS FIGHT TO DECREASE PRICES.

TOKIO, Aug. 4. (I. N. S.)—The city of Tokio has entered the field actively to lessen the burdens of high prices for the poor people. Like food and clothing and other things the rents in Tokio continue unreasonably high; in many cases higher than at any time during the war boom.

It is in this way that the city hopes to give the greatest help to the laboring people. Two large rooming houses already have been constructed in the slum districts. Each will house about 200 persons, and the price is only five sen (about 2½ cents) a night. Food also is served at cost at these places. In nearly every ward the city has also established municipal markets, where rice, fish and vegetables and pickles that form a part of the Japanese meal may be purchased cheaper than elsewhere.

The city bathhouses, however, have made the greatest hit with the people. A reasonable price for the daily bath appears to be more appreciated than cheap food.

RADIO OPERATORS FORM BIG UNION IN BELGIUM.

BRUSSELS, Aug. 4. (I. N. S.)—An international federation of radio operators has been founded here. It will have its chief office in London. Belgian, English, Dutch, Italian and Swedish operators were present at the charter meeting. Resolutions were adopted:

1. That radio operators aboard ship be not asked to do other duties than those which directly concerned radio telegraphy.

2. That the radio-telegraphic service aboard ship be placed under direct and sole control of an authorized operator under the immediate authority of the commanding officer of the ship.

ASKED TO KILL CHICKENS GIRL POISONS HERSELF.

(International News Service.) FLINT, Mich., Aug. 4.—Edna Fanshild has a tender heart. Her mother asked her to kill some "baby chickens" that had been injured in a storm.

The girl started for the coop and then turned suddenly and ran screaming to the house.

"I would rather take my own life than kill little baby chickens," she cried.

Her 9 year old sister ran after her to the bathroom and managed to knock a bottle of poison from her hand after Edna had swallowed half of it.

She has a chance to recover.

DREAMS HE FOUND MONEY AND DREAM COMES TRUE.

(International News Service.) ST. LOUIS, Mo., Aug. 4.—Did you ever dream you had found a large amount of money and awake to find your dream had come true? Possibly not, but you can imagine the pleasant surprise you would have.

Such was the feeling of William H. Mueller as he awoke from a street car in front of his home after spending the night in a section camp several miles away. Standing at his curbing was his automobile, which two bandits had taken, robbing him of his money and driving into the country. Mueller slept at a camp all night and walked to a street car line the next morning.

FRENCHMAN FACES DEATH FOR KILLING CHILDREN.

(International News Service.) SAINT BRIEUC, France, Aug. 4.—Eugene Huguet, forty-one years old, has been condemned to death for the murder of his four children.

He took them from their beds and drowned them in a lake near his home.

"I did it to revenge myself upon their mother, who threatened to divorce me," he told the court.

"I'd rather he would have killed me outright than to have made me suffer death four times," pleaded the young wife and the jury stayed out only a few minutes.

PARIS TICKET SELLER IS ROBBED BY BANDIT.

(International News Service.) PARIS, Aug. 4.—"How many?" It was the dull hour of ten at night. The woman who sells anti-war tickets at the Madeleine Station of the Nord-Sud mechanically handed out two bits of pasteboard.

"I'll take all you've got," said a gruff voice. The woman looked up to see the muzzle of a revolver poked through the grating.

A moment later the owner of the revolver disappeared into the street bearing with him about \$100 in small French coin. Police have no clue but a vague description.

MISSOURI MAN WINNER IN FIDDLING TOURNAY.

(International News Service.) PARIS, Mo., Aug. 4.—The fiddling championship crown in the state of Missouri adorns the brow of Wood Brown, of Monroe County, who led the field of four contestants here last winter.

William Stalcup, champion fiddler of Shelby County, recently felt the sting of defeat at the hands of Brown, when they met to display their bowing and fingering ability to townspeople here. The contest was held in the opera house which was packed.

With a large gold championship medal, which shone with a dazzling brilliancy, pinned to his breast, Brown took the stage and played two selections. A deafening applause was accorded him by the audience. Stalcup then made his bid for the State fiddling championship.

The judges declared Brown virtually clinched the championship with his playing of "The Lost Indian," a selection which is regarded as the acid test for fiddlers in Missouri competitions.

MOTHER OF FOUR FALLS FOR WILES OF VAMPIRE.

(International News Service.) DETROIT, Aug. 4.—Mary Foder, although married and the mother of four children, succumbed to the blandishments of Anthony Vargo and fled with him to Akron, Ohio, where she later married him, according to the \$10,000 alienation of affections suit Foder has filed here against Vargo.

Foder is a farmer living near Belleville. He declares in his bill of complaint that when his wife went to Akron with Vargo he followed her. Two of the children that Mrs. Foder took with her were calling Vargo "papa," he asserts.

When he returned to Detroit he filed suit for divorce. It was granted on the grounds of public policy, and Foder was granted the custody of the children.

WHITE SLAVE ACT DOES NOT APPLY TO WOMEN.

(International News Service.) DENVER, Aug. 4.—The Mann White Slave law is a one sided affair, according to interpretation by local agents of the Federal Department of Justice and cannot be invoked in cases where women transport men from one state to another.

Two girls were held in jail here several hours while federal agents investigated "white slave" charges. The girls, according to Russell Byron, head of the Department of Justice here, declared they had brought two men to this city from Louisville, Ky., in a big touring car. Byron said the girls admitted paying all the expenses of the trip.

The two girls were taken into custody by federal agents in an alleged "love nest" in this city. The two men were also held temporarily.

The party was released after an investigation disclosed that the federal law does not provide that transportation of men from one state to another by women is illegal.

FIRE CHIEFS COMING.

PORTLAND, Aug. 4.—Portland will be host to fire chiefs from several parts of the world August 11 when two delegations will arrive here in special trains bound for the international fire chiefs' convention in San Francisco, August 15-18.

The celebrities will include Paul Vanzinot, chief of the Paris fire department, the chief of the London fire department, and a hundred or more fire fighters from principal cities throughout the world. The French chief is due to arrive here from Seattle at 8:15 a. m. Wednesday.

DROUTH IN BEET CROP BOOSTS SUGAR PRICES.

(International News Service.) PARIS, Aug. 4.—Dryness has put up by leaps and bounds the price of sugar in France.

That dryness, according to L'Intransigent, is of two kinds. One is the dryness that ruined the beet crop last summer. The other is the "American dryness" that has enormously increased sugar consumption in the United States by multiplying the sale of "soft" drinks.

Service Men Are Getting Their Loan.

Deer Make Garden Look Like Pasture.

Deer feeding on his crops have made his farm look like a sheep corral, states Fred Merrill who was in town Friday from Takilma. Mr. Merrill states that crops are doing well, except for the places where the deer get in and trample down what they don't eat. They are much worse than last season, he states.—Oregon Observer, Grants Pass.
