MEDFORD PEARS SHIPPED TO EASTERN MARKETS

MEDFORD, Aug. 11.—The largest pear crop in the history of the Rogue River valley started to move today when three cars were shipped east, and from now until late fall there will be a daily shipment.
Southern Pacific officials estimate the total pear crop at 1150 cars, which is a 50 per cent increase over the largest previous output. The increase, according to local fruit experts, is due to irrigation, which was established on a comprehensive scale this year for the first time.

SHOWERS PROVE BENEFIT TO CROPS IN OREGON

PORTLAND, Aug. 11.—Conservative estimates by crop experts of the traffic lines placed the value of the rain of today and the rain of yesterday, at one million dollars, to western Oregon, judging from the standpoint of increased agricultural crops which will be caused by the arrival of the much-needed moisture at this time. At the same time the rain was said to have caused some damage to cut hay and grain crops, but this was believed to have been immaterial compared to the benefit.
While the rain came too late to have any appreciable effect upon the grain crops, it will prove a great stimulus to the potato and various vegetable crops and to the pastures, many of which had been burned out by the dry weather, it was said. It will also help materially the apple, pear and prune crops and will prove of some benefit to the hops.

Barge Washtucna To Be Floated

Over 150,000 feet of lumber was removed from the deck of the barge Washtucna, which went ashore at the mouth of the Umpqua river about a month ago, says the Port Umpqua Courier. The lumber was made up into small rafts and launched into the sea and towed into the harbor by the tug-boat Tiger. Only a few more rafts now remain on the barge from her deck load, and when this is removed, the barge will be towed into the harbor and beached, and the lumber in the hold of the vessel will then be removed. Sunday night the barge moved off from the sand into the sea about 10 feet, and Monday night it was reported that the barge had moved into the sea about 14 feet. Since last Monday the sea has been so rough that nothing could be done on the barge, but it is expected that the sea will be quiet enough so as to let the crew working on the vessel continue with their work today.
The hull of the vessel seems to be in as good shape as the day it was stranded on the beach, with the exception of some of the corking, which has been washed out.
