Plans For Federal Aid Are Discussed

District Attorney George Neuner today met and conferred with District Forester George H. Cecil, who passed through the city on his way to the Oregon Caves, in reference to federal aid for the construction of the Drain-Scottsboro-Reedsport highway and also federal aid for the completion of the Umpqua-Mill Creek-Loon Lake highway. Both projects are within the Stenslow National forest, particularly the Loon Lake road and that part of the Reedsport highway between Reedsport and Scottsboro which remains unfinished. A plan of procedure was outlined of bringing the applications before the different federal agencies in order that they may give approval and that federal aid may be secured.

The plums are about the size of walnuts, covered with a deep blue bluish, and are somewhat tart, and are altogether very attractive.

BUTNER TO BUILD BIG GREENHOUSE

Will Grow Winter and Spring Vegetables on Commercial Basis.

WORK BEING STARTED

Excavation Made and Materials Ordered for First Structure of Its Kind in the Umpqua Valley.

The erection of the first commercial greenhouse in Douglas county is being started by Foster Butner on his place in West Roseburg. The greenhouse is to be used for the growing of early vegetables and more particularly for the starting of tomato, peppers and like plants, in order that the produce of early gardens may reach the market at a more advantageous time and bring better prices.

The greenhouse will cover about a quarter-acre of land, being 40x150 feet in size. The materials have been ordered, and some are on hand, and it is expected that the structure will be completed about November 1.

Spinach, cucumbers, lettuce, radishes, and other vegetables for the local market will be produced during the late winter and early spring months. Spinach, Mr. Butner states, can be produced throughout the major part of the year when it is not obtainable from the open gardens. Early in the spring, he expects to start tomato plants, and will have them ready to set out in the frames at least two months earlier than at present, according to his present plans.

Heat will be furnished to the greenhouse by hot water, two big boilers having been procured for this purpose. A pit is now being dug to provide flow for the water, and as soon as this is finished, the erection of the building will be started.

"I have always believed," Mr. Butner said, speaking in reference to this new project, "that the Umpqua valley can produce better early garden truck than any other section of the state. Heretofore, we have been handicapped by the lack of proper equipment, and, consequently, could get only on the late market, at a time when the demand was fairly well-filled. By the use of green-houses, I believe that we can put our tomatoes on the market in June instead of August, and in this way get the best prices."

"Hot beds, which have been used in the past, partly solved the problem, but these could not be used early enough in the year. Because of the weather, it was impossible to work them at the right times, and, consequently, the plants were often delayed. With green-houses, however, there is no discomfort to working with the plants, and they can be kept growing until all the danger of freezing is over, and they should be strong and hardy when transplanted so that there will be a rapid growth and development. This will give earlier production and bring about better conditions."

The greenhouse which Mr. Butner is building is not so large as many of those in the Willamette valley, but is the first enterprise of its kind in Douglas county, although there are a number of other green-houses used chiefly by florists. The experiment will doubtless be closely watched, and success will be followed by the construction of other green-houses, and the establishment of this new industry on a firmer basis.
