REGRETTABLE OCCURRENCE.

The assault yesterday afternoon of three Southern Pacific guards at the swimming pool north of this city is the first step of violence of any consequence occurring in this city since the inauguration of the railway strike, which is now on its last lap of a two months' period.

This is a matter that is deeply regretted by the multitude of people who are in sympathy with the striking mechanics. They realize that public sentiment is a big factor in favor of the employees who are bending every effort for a fair and equitable wage schedule, but they cannot, and will not, condone such acts as carried into execution in this city against railroad guards yesterday afternoon.

No good can possibly result from such a policy. Acts of this kind will not command the support of law-abiding citizens, but on the contrary will have a tendency to turn the tide of friendly feeling in favor of the "under dog."

This paper believes the more conservative men among the striking mechanics do not support this sort of lawlessness and are not lending any encouragement to those who are disposed to go to extreme ends in the matter of attempting to settle local difficulties existing between the railroad officials and the striking mechanics. On the contrary, they are willing to await the outcome of present labor difficulties through a decision rendered by authorized labor representatives who are commanding the attention of the nation for a just and equitable settlement of the wage controversy.

The local union should bend every effort to the end that our laws are not violated in the smallest degree. No act should be committed that in any way will cast reflection on the great majority of these men who respect the law to the fullest measure. They cannot afford to have the foundation of their cause honeycombed by acts that detract from the real issue. This course would be disastrous in the extreme and would ultimately destroy the real cause sought to be accomplished by the working men.

The fact that several complaints have been issued from the office of District Attorney Neuner alleging that the strikers were responsible for yesterday's occurrence puts the local union on the defensive and the burden of proof rests not only with the small minority of its members who are disposed to take radical steps toward opposing factions, but the great majority who have the highest respect for law and order are brought into public limelight to defend an action that is not wholly in accord with their sympathies, and that cannot possibly help a cause around which they have builded so strong a bulwark.

As above stated the occurrence is to be regretted and evidence is awaited to place the responsibility where it justly belongs for the trouble resulting between opposing factions in this city yesterday afternoon.

Of all road projects throughout the county, the completion of the Scottsburg-Reedsport highway, connecting the down-river country with the fruit and farming sections of the interior, is, perhaps, the most important to the general public of Douglas county. In this connection it is gratifying to note that contracts were let this week by the county court for finishing another unit in this road, and only a few miles more will now be required to close the gaps and open the thoroughfare to travel. But the last stretch is alleged to be a difficult piece of construction and at least one more year will pass before this work can be done. Completion of this highway will practically give Roseburg a water grade to seaboard towns, and the value of such improvements will be seen in reduced freight rates on commodities shipped in and out of Roseburg, and this in turn will be reflected in lower prices to consumers. Existing high rail freights of necessity will conform to the water rate to tide water plus motor truck charges to interior points. The people will welcome the final opening of this road.

Delays in prosecuting crime encourage more crime. Where trials are postponed, witnesses disappear, people's memory becomes less clear and criminals are apt to elude justice. An illustration of the effect of prompt justice was given recently in Chicago, where as the result of an effort to clear up the murder dockets, 12 of these men were sentenced to death and 12 given prison terms. The effect was remarkable, the murder rate in that city being reduced about one-half. Long delays in administering justice may have as harmful effect as wrong decisions. When vengeance comes swiftly, the result strikes terror to the hearts of evil doers. Justice should be swift as well as firm.

The public generally is awakening to the fact there is too little respect for our laws. Acts of lawlessness are being committed throughout the nation daily that calls for drastic action on the part of authorities and those minds that see into the future portray a reign of terror unless a decided and effective stand is taken by the masses as a whole to check the crime wave sweeping over the country.

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NO EFFECT ON TAXES.
 WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—The government can meet every dollar for the soldiers' bonus without an additional tax levy, Senator McCumber, chairman of the senate finance committee, declared today opening the fight for the bill. He called upon Secretary Mellon and Harding both to reconsider the bill despite their opposition, in the light of present-day conditions. McCumber estimated that the new obligation would total one hundred millions annually for the first three years. It will be met by interest on foreign obligations or current revenues or the sale of a small part of our foreign bonds.

STATE PERMIT NOT NEEDED

Shipments of venison may be made to any point in the state during open season if properly tagged, according to Game Warden Walker. There has been some dispute as to whether or not a state permit was required in making such shipments, and Mr. Walker is in receipt of information

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that during the open season no permit is necessary. Venison may be shipped as baggage or express to any point in the state, but must be tagged according to the law.
