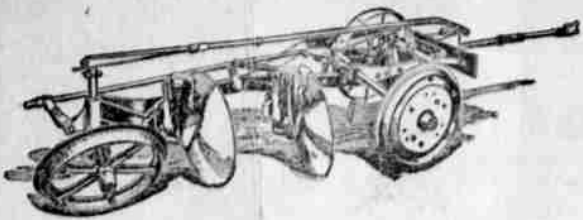

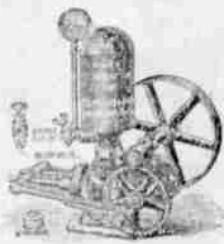

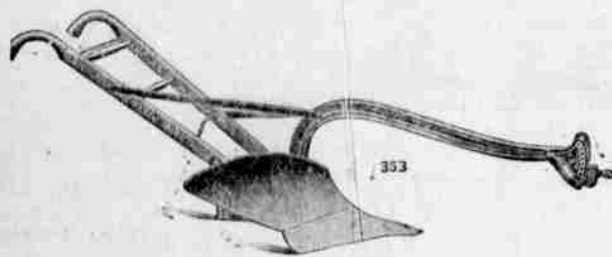

Will Ask 6 Cents

SALEM, Aug. 25.—The Loganberry growers of the Liberty district last night adopted formal resolutions to establish the minimum price for fresh berries of the 1923 crop at six cents and the dried fruit at a price equivalent.

They also drafted a separate resolution inviting the growers of other districts to organize similarly and to send three delegates each to a meeting to be held at some central point on a date agreeable to all in order that the finer points of cooperation might be worked out.

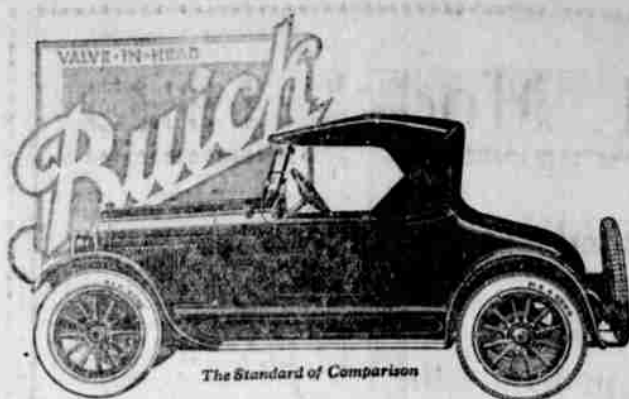

MAN INDICTED FOR ALLEGED FRAUD IN ELECTION

PORTLAND, Aug. 26.—William H. Emrick, chairman of the counting board in precinct 261, was indicted on five distinct counts by the Multnomah county grand jury yesterday as a result of the probe into irregularities in that district ordered by District Attorney Myers when startling discrepancies between the votes cast and the ballots credited to candidates were discovered in the course of the Hall-Of-count recount.

The grand jurors found that votes legally cast were not counted for at least five candidates at the primaries, in effect, exonerated all members of the election board in this precinct from criminal liability except the chairman, who rend off the purported votes from the majority of ballots cast.

Emrick was released on \$2500 bond shortly before 6 o'clock last night after he had been in the county jail for about three hours.

"Frame-up?" was the comment of Emrick when he was lodged in the county jail. He expressed confidence in his ability to prove that there had been a conspiracy to "get" him and that the ballots had been tampered with since sealed and delivered to the county clerk. Emrick declined to make an extended statement in the absence of his attorney, Chester A. Sheppard, who was in Seattle.
