Ice Mine Thought To Be 50,000 Years Old

(International News Service.)
CA, N. Y., Aug. 28.—Winter's summer heat is responsible for the freak ice mine at Coudersport, Pa., which may be as old as the ice age, declares Prof. von Engel, of the geology department, Cornell university, in announcing the result of an extensive examination of nature's own refrigerator.

hill tops sinks into the pores and crevices of rock formations and slowly expels the warm air which had penetrated there during the preceding summer. Ordinarily this process of interchange, elsewhere, takes place locally, that is, over each little area of surface independently.

"But at Coudersport the joining-up of rock crevices and passages seems to be so arranged that the air circulation of a wide region is focused on one spot, the area of the ice mine. At that point all the accumulation of warm air in summer is slowly forced out from September on, melting the ice."

"During the winter the heavier cold air completes the process by adding its extra weight. In summer the mass of rocks filled with cold air is analogous to a reservoir filled with water. The opening, low, on the slope of the hills, is a vent through which it can escape under pressure."

"At that time the air temperatures, both in the valleys and on the hilltops, are about the same; accordingly the cold air, confined by the rocks, as the water in the tanks, emerges at the low outlet and pushes up, displacing the lighter warm air above the vent. Of course, as the tank is emptied below, warm air enters the rock crevices above just as light air fills in the space made vacant when water is withdrawn from a tank."

Freak Temperature.
"To freeze water the temperature of cold air which emerges must be below 32 degrees F. This is possible, for the air temperatures of winter at Coudersport are commonly much below the freezing point. But to offset that is the fact that the earth almost universally maintains a uniform temperature the year round only a few feet below the surface of the ground."

"The air temperatures in the Mammoth cave remain the same year around. Accordingly, there must be at Coudersport, some set of conditions which cuts off the area of the mine supply from the interior of the earth heat, or renders this ineffective at that locality, if winter cold, only, is held to explain the freak."

"Again, the water which is frozen by the escaping cold air is water which percolates through the rocks themselves as does the air. Why, then, does the water not either freeze before emergence, or indeed seal up the rock crevices so the cold air cannot get in? Possibly the water is only scantily supplied from a source quite close to the opening and does not have an opportunity to become cooled off enough to freeze until it emerges."

Expansion and Pressure.
"Possibly pressure and expansion phenomena are involved; that is, the air on emergence and expansion cools several degrees. Thus ice is said to form about the small openings at the top of large gasoline tanks from which the vapor escapes and expands. Or it may be that the water acts as a carrier of the cold air in the same way that a dentist's suction pump keeps the mouth clear of saliva while he tinkers with your teeth."

POPE PIUS TO CUT EXPENSES

ROME, Aug. 28.—The economic crisis which has all Europe worried has even penetrated into the quiet of the Vatican, according to the information in well-informed circles.

The Vatican is faced with financial difficulties, it is learned, and the Pope has ordered strenuous retrenchments.

With the inauguration of a new Pontificate it is customary for the bishops of various dioceses to make offerings to the Vatican, but these offerings have been slow in reaching Rome because many of the bishops have preferred to bring the offerings in person.

The late Pope Benedict was both generous and lavish, and it is reliably stated that his expenditures made heavy inroads upon the Vatican treasury, although many of those heavy expenditures were for philanthropic purposes.

Pope Pius has demonstrated that besides his great intellectual and religious position he is an administrator, and it is stated that he is inaugurating a system which is virtually a budget system and that Vatican expenditures are being placed upon a basis which coincides with the receipts.

Pope Pius has begun his retrenchment in the expenditures in his own household, and it is understood that he is now living under conditions of the strictest economy.

mobile into an oblivion that would have been complete enough at least to permit of his safe escape.

Acts of Insane Man.
"Those other automobile tracks have never been explained."

"Here we must account for Brumfield's dispatching a box of 'junk' to Seattle from Myrtle Creek, as well as for his actions after the crime. A man nearly insane from some unexplained worry sent that box from Myrtle Creek under an assumed name."

"None but a crazy man would even attempt to send a box under an assumed name in an express office presided over by a man who knew him as well as I do. The express agent knew Brumfield when the box was sent as Dr. Brumfield."

"His action previous to the crime was the action of an insane man and a maniac was the author of his subsequent actions—insanity coming to its peak in the face of the murder of Russell. Brumfield fled in insane terror. His trial showed, however, that he made no particular effort at hurrying out of the country nor in covering up his tracks as he went north."

"His worry had induced an 'insane' desire to get away from the causes thereof and the murder was merely coincidental with plans to flee blindly after leaving his family well cared for."

"The fact that Brumfield wore some of the clothes of the dead man may also be explained by the insanity theory, for if Brumfield donned any of the slain man's clothes, certainly he would have made the change complete unless he had been crazy."

"The trial of the Brumfield case never yielded a motive for the crime the dentist was charged with, and it never proved the presence of a woman in the case. It never explained the presence of the bullet wounds in Russell's body, and it did not account for Brumfield's money."

"Most important of all, it seems to me, the trial did not explain the presence of those other automobile tracks at the Russell shack."
