POLICE SEEK BANDITS

TACOMA, Aug. 28.—The police between Tacoma and Portland are seeking two bandits who staged a hold daylight robbery of a fruit store here yesterday, kidnapped a taxi driver and drove his car toward Portland. They threw him out at Chehalis, after robbing him. The abandoned taxicab was found this morning at Castle Rock.

Southern Pacific Makes Statement

With reference to the shopmen's strike, the management of the Southern Pacific company reported today progressive improvement in operating results as follows:

"The fact that more traffic is being moved at this time than for the corresponding period last year, and that both locomotive load and gross ton miles per train hour increased, shows clearly that the equipment is doing more work per unit and is therefore in as good if not better condition at this time than it was for the same period last year.

During the second week of August, traffic on the Southern Pacific preponderated eastward and the gross ton miles on main line were 4.3 per cent greater than last year, while the average locomotive was 10.7 per cent greater than last year. Gross ton miles per train hour increased 2.1 per cent. In other words, compared with the same period last year an increase of \$7,679,000 gross ton miles eastward was moved with a decrease of seven-tenths of one per cent in train miles and a decrease of five and eight-tenths per cent in locomotive miles, indicating both heavier train and locomotive loads. The average locomotive load in both directions increased seven and nine-tenths per cent, showing that locomotives are in good condition, and have not deteriorated as result of the strike.

"The management announced that shop forces now number 10,000 men and are being increased daily, a number of the old men having returned to work during the last few days. The normal force is approximately 15,000 men."

(United Press)—One United States sailor is believed dying, two others are suffering from knife wounds, scores are booked for disorderly conduct, and the St. Charles hotel was partially wrecked as the result of a riot which raged thru the downtown streets for hours last night and early this morning. Two thousand sailors from the Pacific fleet participated.

INDUSTRY OF COUNTRY NOT TO FOLLOW FORD LEAD

CHICAGO, Aug. 28.—Hearing by the United States railroad labor board was begun today on the petition of the United Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way employees and the railroad shop laborers of over 100 railroads for an increase in the minimum of wages from 23 cents to 48 cents per hour and the virtual demand for recognition the basic 8 hour day with time and a half for over time.

Earl Hackett Kills Self at Portland

Captain Earl A. Hackett, well known in this city, where he has visited on numerous occasions, committed suicide sometime Friday afternoon at his home in Portland. Earl Hackett was the son of Captain M. A. Hackett, president of the Mackett Digger company, who is the owner of a large orchard near the forks of the river in this county. The younger Mr. Hackett, had been in poor health for a number of years. He had been despondent during much of that time and has been under the constant surveillance of relatives as they feared attempts on his part to take his own life. On Friday, he was left alone for a short time and went into the kitchen and after shutting the room up tight turned on the gas coals of the kitchen range. He is survived by a widow and two children. The funeral was held this afternoon at 1 p. m. at Finley's mortuary with interment in the Rose City cemetery.

Buddies to Aid New Orleans Police Chief During Convention

(International News Service.)

NEW ORLEANS, La., Aug. 28.—Confronted with the task of handling a crowd of 150,000 visitors to the American Legion national convention, to be held here in October, Police Superintendent Guy R. Molony will call his brother Legionnaires into action. One thousand uniformed former soldiers, Molony has announced, will be deputized to assist his police force in regulating the large crowds that will throng the parade route. The Legionnaires, he says, will serve as "provost guards" in the business district during the five days of the convention.

Superintendent Molony is himself an active member of the American Legion and expects to participate in the sessions of the convention.

During a recent visit to Kansas City Molony investigated conditions prevailing in that city during last year's American Legion convention. He discovered, he states, that city and police officials have no criticism to make concerning the way in which the 150,000 visiting former service men conducted themselves. Kansas City, he learned, would welcome the opportunity of having the organization again choose Kansas City as their convention city.

"With Legion men aiding us in protecting life and property during the



convention," says Molony, "I do not anticipate any trouble from the usual number of crooks that would flock to New Orleans for the idea of preying upon the innocent city and upon visiting dignitaries. My buddies will uphold the law."
