(International News Service.) LONDON, Aug. 29.—"Turn the key on scandal."

That is the motto of the latest society in England.

You hold a padlock in the hand, with due solemnity turn the key, and pronounce these words:

"I promise to do my utmost never to say an unkind thing about anyone, whether true or untrue."

And having said, henceforth you are admitted a member of the "Padlock Society."

Dr. Armstrong Smith, of Letchworth, England, is the founder of the movement, and his ambition will not rest until millions of people in every country in the world have enlisted under the banner.

"In the course of a few weeks ten countries have joined us," says Dr. Armstrong Smith, "and in another month we hope to have a million members. Our adherents are scattered over Britain, United States, Ireland, France, Spain and Switzerland."

"What gives me most satisfaction is that two of our first members were respectively a policeman and a hotel keeper."

The rules of the society are simple and must be accepted wholeheartedly by every entrant. They are:

1. Get a padlock and unlock it.

2. Repeat the pledge in the presence of three witnesses and lock the padlock.

3. To remain a member repeat the promise with an open padlock in the presence of three members every New Year's Day.

There are no fees, no forms and no inquiries. All the society insists on is a promise to try to be more tolerant.

Will Advertise Oregon Prunes

The prune situation, from a marketing standpoint, might easily become very serious, according to M. J. Newhouse, assistant general manager of the Oregon Growers' Co-Operative association, in a review of the present outlook.

The association which has sold 90 percent of the 1922 crop, plans to advertise quite extensively in order to place Oregon prunes before the consumers, and to stimulate sales in the future. At least one-sixth of a cent per pound will be expended this year by the Oregon Growers' Co-Operative association and the Clark County Packing corporation, according to present plans. This will be the largest advertising campaign ever staged in the interest of the Oregon prune, it is stated. "What the prune growers need," says Mr. Newhouse, "is wider organization. Every grower should be in some kind of an organization which would make possible a greater advertising campaign, more markets and wider distribution."

The harvest season, it is believed, will be longer than usual this year, which will decrease congestion in the driers with an expected reduction in loss of fruit. The drop which was reported as abnormal in many sections has been relieved by the rains. Fruit in all sections will size-up considerably, but it is believed small sizes will predominate.

Want Prune Pools Closed Early

Action favoring an early closing of the 1922 prune pools and the creation of separate pools for the French and Oregon varieties was taken by the directors of the Willamette valley district of the Oregon Growers' Co-Operative association, at a recent meeting at Salem, according to board members. It was stated that the pools should be closed in order to protect members who will benefit by high prices obtained by the association, and who would otherwise sustain a loss due to a probable price decline.

New members who sign up after the pools are closed will have to accept the prices obtained for their fruit through a second pool created for their benefit. It was announced, should a large additional tonnage be signed up. The suggested date for closing the pools is September 15. However, the final action will be taken by the board, but it is understood that the Willamette valley directors will insist upon an early closing.

Prominent Drain Woman is Dead

DRAIN, Aug. 28.—Mrs. Mary Eccleston, a highly esteemed Oregon pioneer, died at the home of her son, Harry Eccleston, in Drain at 2 a. m. Sunday morning last, the end coming peacefully after several months' illness.

The deceased lady is believed to be the fifth oldest native daughter of the state of Oregon, having been born on Salt creek several miles west of Salem in Polk county a little more than 71 years ago. She has resided in Drain the last 33 years and has a host of friends who mourn her demise.

She is survived by her husband, Isaac Eccleston, four sons, Charles and George Eccleston, of Lakeview, Oregon; Frank Eccleston, of North Yakima, Washington, and Harry B. Eccleston, of Drain, and one daughter, Mrs. William Smith, of Heetsa, Oregon. She also leaves several grandchildren to mourn her demise, four of whom she has reared, having been left motherless in young childhood. A daughter, Mrs. George Peckley, died early last spring at Buckley, Washington.

Mrs. Eccleston was born several years before Oregon was admitted to statehood and was one of the sterling characters that helped to carry a civilization out of a country that had hardly begun to be settled. The funeral will take place from the Methodist church, of which Mrs. Eccleston had been a consistent member for many years, Rev. F. G. Drake, the pastor, having charge of the services. Burial will be made in the local cemetery.
