Princess Nagako Masters Typing May Be Stenographer for Prince

TOKIO, Aug. 30.—An expert gardener and a lover of all outdoors, an accomplished poetess and painter, perfectly at home whether at the piano, on the tennis court, at a typewriter, in the photographic darkroom or in her little paddy field; an intelligent student of world languages and world happenings, deeply pious, sympathetic, beautiful and possessed of a lovely disposition—that is the 19-year-old Satsuma maiden destined to become the next Empress of Japan. For four years now she has prepared for the time when she will become the bride of the Prince Regent, assuming the enormous responsibilities thought a mere girl, which will be increased upon the actual ascension of the Prince Hirohito to the throne of the empire. Yet she remains a child in many ways and retains her former interest in her occupations; today she keeps up her little garden at the Kuni palace, tending the plants and flowers herself and even raising a crop of rice each year, wading barefoot in the murky paddy field, and then harvesting the rice to place it as an offering to the spirits of the Imperial ancestors at the shrine of the Imperial palace.

Not at All Elusive.

It was a year ago in cherry blossom time that I first saw her. Clad in the blue kimono and dark red skirt of the Japanese school girl, and with her hair in a braid down her back, she sat with a younger sister on the front row at a private recital given by foreign musicians. But it is no task to catch a glimpse of this little princess; at any sunrise, when the Kuni family is in the capital, she may be seen going from the family palace along the road and into the Imperial palace to make her daily prayers at the Imperial shrine.

It would seem that she is economical, too. Just the other day officials of the Imperial Household department carried to the prince regent an outlined budget for cover costs of the wedding. It totalled 2,000,000 yen; it was too much; the princess

agreed and the amount was cut in half. Although rumor has it that the prince regent is deeply in love with his future bride, they have not seen each other since the princess was three years old. Really the match was made in January, 1918, but it was not announced until March, 1921. Formal announcement came in June of this year, the betrothal ceremony will be held in September. The wedding, it is said, will be in April or May of next year.

Statesmen Make Match.

Satsuma statesmen made the match. When it became known the famous "serious affair of the Imperial family" followed last year and ended with the crown prince declaring that he intended to wed Princess Nagako and the Imperial family voted his wish. It was a great blow to the imperialistic Chohan clan, which has been accustomed to picking the emperor's consort. It was a great blow to Prince Yamagata—one which probably hastened his death.

Selected to wed the crown prince in 1918 although secretly, Princess Nagako was taken from the Peeress school and with two girl friends for companions was placed under a corps of competent instructors at home. Ethics, Chinese classics, Japanese language and literature, English, French, history, geography, international politics and sciences have been taught her since. In addition she has become quite accomplished with oil and water colors and is now taking up charcoal drawing.

She may plan to be the prince regent's stenographer, too, for she has mastered the typewriter. Possessed of a fine soprano voice, she is being trained in singing by experts, and already she is able to play difficult music on the piano.

And maybe some day there will be a jax dance in the Imperial palace; the spirits of former emperors would probably cause a great commotion in the empire, but it appears not impossible. Princess Nagako is said to be learning the intricacies of western dancing, while the prince regent, after seeing the Prince of Wales doing his latest steps at the British embassy ball last spring, declared he would learn them, too.

Out-of-Door Girl.

It is out of doors that Princess Nagako feels most at home. During leisure hours she is generally with her sisters on the tennis court at her home or back a little farther
