GERMANS TO PAY WAR DEBTS

PARIS, Aug. 25.—"The many" is to become the master of common labels in the devastated areas these days. Beginning this month, the Germans in these districts are ordered, from Germany, to order goods equal in value to the damage caused them by the war. JUDGE SHELBREDE DIES AT CORVALLIS

CORVALLIS, Aug. 25.—A. Schlbrede died at his home here this morning. He was 70 years of age. Mr. Schlbrede was born in Louisville, Kentucky, and came to Oregon in 1877, locating at Roseburg where he practiced law. He was married in the Downey to Roseburg.

Mr. Schlbrede was elected to the legislature from Douglas county in 1897, and the following year was appointed judge by President Taft for the southeastern district with headquarters at Eugene.

Schlbrede was judge of the district during the famous Smith case crimes, and took an active part in bringing the Smith gang to justice.

Judge Schlbrede was a preacher of government that all but lawless countrymen. A mob broke open the jail and a part of the Smith gang were incarcerated, with the intention of hanging them to the gallows. The judge left his home in the middle of the night, went through the mob and brought them to justice, upholding the dignity of the government and permitting it to take its course. Because of his honesty and very energetic work the mob surrendered and returned the prisoners. The prisoners afterward were convicted of numerous crimes and some were hanged.

On his return from San Francisco Schlbrede went to Hanbury to practice law. While there he was president of the Douglas county bar association and also president of the state and the Christian church.

Five years ago he came to Corvallis on account of failing health. Here he had practiced law since his arrival, though he deplored the fact that he had been too feeble to pay attention to his law practice.

Funeral services will be held Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Rev. C. W. Reynolds officiating. Interment will be held in the Roseburg cemetery, where the services will be in charge of the Odd Fellows, which organization Mr. Schlbrede had been a member for nearly 40 years.

Judge Schlbrede, who had been reported from Corvallis, was for a number of years a resident of Roseburg and one of the city's most prominent citizens. He had an active law practice while in Roseburg, and was one of the best-known attorneys in the state and figured in some of the most important cases of the county. He was an active church worker and one of the incorporators of the Christian church. He leaves a number of friends in this city who are deeply grieved to learn of his death.
