Interesting Meeting of the Rotary Club

A very interesting meeting of the Rotary club was held today noon at which time Chas. A. Lockwood, of the Ford Motor Co., spoke on "My Own Business," giving a clear insight to the many branches of his establishment and the efficient manner in which his trade is handled.

Frank J. Norton of the local cannery was another gentleman who addressed the club in reference to his canning plant which is now operating a large force of men and women in caring for the pear crop which is now being harvested. Mr. Norton stated his plant would handle about 425 tons of pears during the present season, and they are arranging to care for about six cars of pears, after which the apple crop will be ready to handle by the cannery. There are at present 175 people employed by Mr. Norton's plant and the payroll averages approximately \$425 a day, which is evidence of the importance of this plant to the laboring people of Roseburg as well as to the fruit industry of the county.

Desire Change Marriage Vows

PORTLAND, Aug. 30.—Revision of the Book of Common Prayer, including the proposal to delete the bride's promise to "obey" from the marriage ceremony and elimination of the bridegroom's endorsement of the bride with his worldly goods, divorced women's status in the church, church unity and other vital religious problems were up for consideration by the 139 bishops of the Episcopal church in the United States at an informal conference of the members of the house of bishops starting today, preliminary to the assembling one week hence of the 47th triennial general convention of the Episcopal church. Most of the members of the house of bishops are already in Portland, having arrived here during the past 24 hours from continental United States as well as from China, Japan, the Philippines, East Africa, Europe, South America, the West Indies and Alaska.

The preliminary conferences of the bishops will continue through the week. Most important of the questions which the convention will consider and which the bishops' conference will therefore give most attention is the matter of the revision of the Book of Common Prayer. This revision has been pending for six years and involves, in addition to the changes in the marriage ceremony, about 200 other proposed changes of greater or less importance.

SCHOOL COURSE TO BE REVISED
SALEM, Aug. 30.—J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of schools, today appointed a committee composed of J. E. Bexell, dean of the school of commerce of Oregon Agricultural college; J. F. ANXIOUS FOR A VOTE ON LIGHT WINES AND BEER

CHICAGO, Aug. 30.—Petitions bearing the names of 600,000 Illinois men and women who want a popular vote on an amendment to the state and federal laws permitting sale of beer and light wines were completed today. They will be hauled to Springfield via motor truck and placed on file in the office of the secretary of state, so that the question may be placed on the ballot for a state-wide referendum in November.

One third of the qualified voters of the state signed the petition. About 250,000 of the names were procured in Chicago. The motor truck containing the petition was driven through the downtown streets today. En route to Springfield the truck will stop at all towns for local demonstrations in favor of beer. On Friday several hundred Chicagoans will go to Springfield to be present when the petition is filed.

New Chemical May Check Worm Which Wrecks Wharves

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 31.—The submarine terror of peace times is about to be checked.

The teredo boring destroyer of piling, which is credited with having done a million dollars worth of damage to structures at salt water ports, may be definitely put out of business through the efforts of a little band of scientists who for two years have worked ceaselessly in an effort to find some method of destroying the little pest that eats his way through the staunchest pilings and destroys wharves, breakwaters and marine foundations of all sorts.

These scientists who have been conducting experiments under the direction of Professor J. S. Burd, head of the department of agricultural chemistry at the University of California, Berkeley, are reported to have found a chemical which is death dealing to the teredo.

Hitherto almost every sort of paint, oil and chemical has been tried by port authorities without avail. The menace of the teredo had become so general on the Pacific coast that government reports fixed the damage at \$15,000,000 a year, with prospects of its growing worse.

The teredo is peculiarly a Pacific port pest, although flourishing elsewhere. The warm waters of the Japan current which flows along the Pacific coast is particularly to the liking of the little marine borer. Ship owners have long had trouble with the marine pest through its propensity to eat away ship bottoms.

So serious has been its inroads on piling that it has developed a new type of railroad man—the underwater inspector. Alois Neubert is the only known "submarine railroadman." He is employed by a large railroad company having extensive water front properties. He works entirely by "feel" doing most of his work of inspecting piling of wharves and bridges and "feeling over" underwater areas where construction work is planned, in muddy harbor water, where the sense of eyesight is of little use. He devotes most of his time to locating teredo inroads before they become serious enough to cause disaster.

Neubert, from experience on many jobs in tropical waters, says the popular impression of the man-eating shark is exaggerated. The "wolf of the sea" will not usually molest man unless injured or harassed, Neubert says.

Flight Over Pole Abandoned Pro Tem
