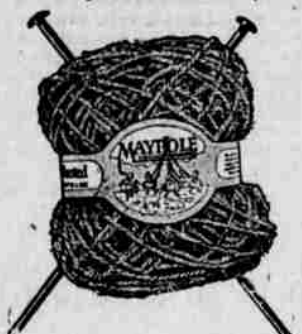

Lady Rhondda, First Woman to Fight for House of Lords Here

WILL RENEW HER FIGHT TO GAIN HIGH POST

NEW YORK, Aug. 31.—Travelling incognito with a companion, Viscountess Rhondda, militant suffrage leader and the first woman to fight for a seat in the British house of lords, slipped quietly into New York recently on the liner Adriatic for a much-needed vacation.

She succeeded in escaping reporters who met the vessel at the dock, and scarcely any of the passengers knew that she was aboard.

Last reports were that she had registered at Stonington Manor inn at Stonington, Connecticut.

Will Not Lecture.
 Viscountess Rhondda does not intend to appear before the American public, either in the role of a lecturer, like Mrs. Asquith, or to ally herself with the women's organizations, like Lady Astor.

She attributes her failure to win a seat in the house of lords to Lord Birkenhead, the lord chancellor, who, she says, is a man of great force.

"It will come," she declared, referring to the recognition of women by the peers. "It is a matter of principle and it must be set right."

"In England we hold your women's progress up constantly before our women, and I hear you feel somewhat the same way about us. Women are working together very well in England, and I do feel that we are ripe for 'equal rights.' The best men are with us."

Second Visit Here.

Among the measures for which the viscountess is working and which belong to the equal rights group, are equal pay for men and women in civil service work, a widowed mothers' pension bill, a bill to make parents equal guardians of their children and a bill to change the status of illegitimate children.

ADVICE TO THE LOVELORN
