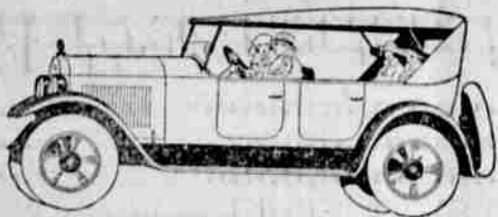

OVERSEAS NURSE IS HELD FOR KILLING OF MEXICAN

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., Sept. 4.—Ollie Browers, 45, who said she was an overseas nurse during the world war, was arrested today in connection with the death of Tom Montaya, Mexican sheepherder, at Beaver marsh Friday night. The prisoner is proprietor of an inn near the scene of the killing of the Mexican, who was shot three times.

I. A. Towey, deputy coroner, reported that the crime was discovered by Mr. and Mrs. A. A. Lory, of Amity, who were camped near Beaver marsh on the night of the killing. The campers were awakened by a woman's cry of "Tom, Tom, for God's sake, don't do that."

The cry was followed by three shots. Then the deep silence settled over the marsh. The campers were too unnerved to investigate. The next morning they found the body, and drove away in terror. They met H. E. Meas, deputy sheriff, to whom they reported the crime.

Meas, with F. A. McDaniels and W. R. Throckmorton, investigated, and notified the authorities. Sheriff Low and a squad of deputies took charge of the case. Ollie Browers, according to the deputy coroner, was little concerned over her arrest. She declared that she knew nothing of the case, and would employ Dan Malarkey, Portland attorney, to defend her.

Her arrest was largely the result of a statement by another sheepherder, who said Montaya told him he was going to the inn. The officers said that footprints, plainly made by a man and a woman, were traced from the inn to the spot where the body was found. There were signs of a struggle, and the officers declared, a woman's tracks leading back in the direction of the inn. The woman was locked in jail here. Montaya had two bullet holes in his chest and one beside the left ear.

HUNT FOR HEIR TO 2 MILLION IS REWARDED

POPULAR BLUFF, Mo., Sept. 5.—After a world-wide search for William Sample, heir to a fortune estimated at \$2,500,000, lasting for four months, the new millionaire was found on a steamship in the harbor of Bangkok, Siam, ready to sail to America for a visit to his home in southeast Missouri.
George Pind, of Cape Girardeau, has been conducting the search in order that he might turn over the vast fortune to its owner. The fortune was left to Sample by relatives who recently died.
As the news of the search for Sample found its way to every nook and corner of the globe, hundreds of "William Samples" applied to Pind for the money. When they would arrive at Cape Girardeau and find Pind, the latter would make them turn round, and he would look at the back of their necks before making any statement.
Pind stated, after the rightful owner of the fortune was located, that the rightful heir had a scar on the back of his neck and that this mark would be the deciding factor in ascertaining the one William Sample for whom he was searching.
When he was found, Sample said he had been in Siam for a number of years and did not know of the search being conducted for him. He appeared to be greatly pleased with the news of his newly-acquired millions and could hardly wait until his boat left for America. He was found by an amateur detective who had been assigned to assist in locating Sample. The detective, according to Pind, was paid \$5000 for his successful search.
A greater part of the legacy acquired by Sample is in a diamond mine in South Africa. It is claimed.
