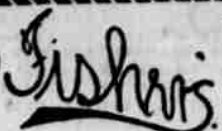

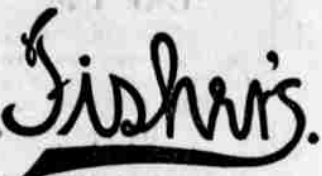

Aviation Field Is In Good Condition

The Roseburg aviation field was put in fine shape today and was pronounced by Lieutenant Morgan to be ideal. A runway 800 feet in length and 100 feet in width was scraped and dragged, and is now as smooth as a floor. Planes can now land in perfect safety and with no rough ground to break axles as has been the case up to the present time. A great deal of credit for the improvement of this field is due to Harvey Brown, of the Douglas Fire Pa-

trol, Lee G. Devaney, C. A. Lockwood and the Lockwood Motor company, and H. L. Hyland and the Standard Oil company. Mr. Lockwood donated the use of a tractor operator, and Mr. Hyland furnished gasoline and oil without charge. The country's scraper was requisitioned. Lieutenant Goldsboro has been notified that the field is now in good condition and will probably make an official inspection at once.

R. A. Hercher Speaks Before Rotary Club

The outstanding feature of today's luncheon of the local Rotary club was an excellent talk by R. A. Hercher, president of the Douglas County Farm Bureau.

Mr. Hercher's subject, "What a City Can Do to Help the Farmer," was handled in a plain, business-like manner and brought out some wholesome truths regarding the agricultural resources of this county and those who are engaged in this pursuit. He made it plain that there is no particular friction between the farmer and the townspeople, but he did state that neither could be prosperous without the assistance of the other, and that it required just as much thought, just as much care and business judgment to be a successful farmer as a successful business man, and until the farmer had been put on a higher business plane, his products sold at a fair margin of profit, and he is given the privilege of purchasing at a like profit, neither the city business man or the rural resident would accomplish the desired results, that of general prosperity among these two important classes.

Another matter he called attention to the members of the club, was the fact that it would be a great relief to the fruitmen of the county if the opening of the public schools in this city could be postponed for two weeks, thus allowing many children to help in gathering the fruit crops of this section of the state and avoiding great loss by employing inefficient help, which is made necessary by the early opening of the public schools. It would also give needy families an opportunity to earn generous sums of money to tide them over the winter months, a healthy resource they are now deprived of, just at the opening of the prune season. Several outside visitors were present today to enjoy the programs.

England Must Accede to Demand

Attention was issued throwing light on the origin of the sudden conference. It was intimated that the situation instead of undergoing a change for the worse, might be considered much easier.

The assumption is that the council considered the projected peace conference and M. Poincare's explicit statement that under no circumstances would French soldiers be employed against the Kemalists.

British Fear Zone Invasion. Evidence that the British government has apprehension that Kemal Pasha might attempt to invade the neutral zone is found in the anxiety the government displays to make clear that the Greeks at no time have been within the Chanan neutral zone.

This statement reveals the desire to prove that Kemal has no valid excuse to violate the neutral zone. That this anxiety is not misplaced, is indicated in news dispatches from the Associated Press correspondent at Constantinople today that Turkey demands a free hand in the present crisis and the report current in Constantinople that the Kemalists are preparing for an attempt on the straits before the end of the present
