Henry E. Duck Season Will Open Next Week

PORTLAND, Sept. 22.—Duck hunters in Western Oregon have in prospect one of the finest seasons in recent years when the ban is lifted October 1, announces A. E. Burghdoff, state game warden.

Duck preserves on the lower Columbia, especially on Deer and Santitas islands are well stocked, mostly with native birds. Reports from Tillamook and Coos bays are that sportmen will bag the limit without difficulty.

The season in eastern Oregon opened September 16. Shooting in Baker, Union and Klamath counties is excellent, say reports. Burghdoff returned from the Baker district this morning with tales of duck dinners being enjoyed by half the population.

Shooting in the Willamette valley between Salem and Eugene will not be good until the fall rains set in, says Burghdoff.

The limit is twenty-five in a day, or thirty in seven consecutive days. The western Oregon season runs from October 1 to January 15, and in eastern Oregon from September 16 to December 31.
