THE SITUATION REVIEWED.

With the completion of the Roseburg-Myrtle Point highway, which very soon will be accomplished, a new era opens for the Coos Bay country, remarks the Daily News, published at Marshfield.

For the past ten years or so the American people, the merchant, the farmer, the banker and the mechanic, have been taking to the open road every summer in ever increasing numbers until every highway worthy of note carries a traffic of tourists that it is almost impossible for one who has not spent considerable time on them to comprehend. The windshod wheels are carrying the gasoline gypsy to every corner of the United States while the venturesome ones know their Mexico and their Canada as well as many of us not so long ago, knew the next county.

Coos county, however, being off the Pacific highway and the Coast highway being at best a serious undertaking, has seen little of the tourist travel. Bad roads, the tourist will use, but only where they are the only roads, and side trips to appeal to him must offer exceptional inducements if he is to put himself and his car through the strain attendant to traveling a road that is barely passable.

Of inducements the Coos country is not lacking—scenery, hunting, fishing, seashore and camp life, all the things that lure the tourist on have been here always.

And at last they are accessible over roads which it is a pleasure to drive.

It remains for Coos county to complete unit routes and tell the tourist what it has to offer. Then the county will reap the benefits to be derived from these knights of the open road.

NATIONAL FOREST FUND FOR SCHOOLS AND ROADS.

Oregon and Washington have just received \$179,418.85 from the federal government for roads and schools. Oregon, second on the list draws \$110,015.21 while Washington receives \$69,393.64. The above amount goes to the counties of the two states in which there are National Forest areas.

The Governors of 28 states have just been notified that 25 per cent of the \$3,421,531 received from timber sales, grazing permits and other sources of national forest revenues for the past fiscal year will be distributed by the Forest Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture. These moneys are returned to states in which national forests are located for expenditure upon schools and roads.

An additional 10 per cent of the total receipts is transferred to the Forest Service for the construction of roads and trails within the forests, and this sum for the present year amounts to \$338,576.

The total, which aggregates over one million dollars, will be prorated among the 28 states in proportion to the receipts from the national forests within their borders. Since the establishing of the national forests the sums returned to these states have steadily increased, and today amount to almost 14 million dollars, which has been directly contributed to the development of the states by the national forests within their borders.

California, where federal timber lands returned to the Government \$628,765 during the past year, leads the list and will receive \$157,191 for the school and road fund and \$62,876 for national forest roads and trails. Oregon is second.

MIGHT HAVE SHORTENED WAR

English Soldier's Scruples, Which Did Him Honor, Prolonged Fighting in South Africa.

A military correspondent of the Manchester (Eng.) Guardian writes: "In a life as replete with adventure as was that of Christian De Wet during the Boer war, there were said to have been countless occasions when the Boer hero went near to death. The nearest occurred in 1901, when the guerrilla leader, at the height of his fame, was extricating his raiding column from its affair in the Cape Colony. He was headed off by several of the pursuing detachments. From one of these a couple of very young British cavalry troopers had been sent on a forward patrol. They stopped at a wayside store, and stabled their horses in a back shed. "When the Boer commando came through in haste the woman of the store, who was friendly to the two English boys, sent them up into the garret above her shop. Here they crouched with their rifles at the ready while the scouts and the main body of the commando went through. Then a Cape art came along and drew up at the store to elicit some information. In it were seated Christian De Wet and President Steyn. "The corporal recognized De Wet from the pictures he had seen, but though his finger was upon the trigger his heart failed him. As he said in cross-examination afterward: 'I had not the heart to shoot a man in "trikes" in cold blood.' This lad's natural scruples probably postponed the Boer war by eighteen months. Of such incidents is history made."

Mrs. Bene B. Sterling of Little Rock, Ark., holds the unique record of 50 years of teaching in the public schools of that city. Bee's Sting.

A bee loses its sting and its life when it stings a person, because of the peculiar shape of the sting. It is usually a working bee that stings humans, for although the queen has a sting, she generally uses it only on rival queens. The working bee's sting is just a tube which carries the poison. The tube is fitted with two sharply toothed minute saws, which are driven into the wound alternately. If the person who is being stung remains perfectly still, the bee can withdraw its sting somewhat after the fashion of a corkscrew—that is, by moving round in a circular direction. In which case, of course, it lives to sting again. Usually, however, the outraged human retaliates on the bee, which, driven away, performs leaves its sting, tearing away a portion of the stomach to which it is attached, and so killing itself.
