FIRE PREVENTION WORK.

With the American people throwing away close to \$300,000,000 annually in fire losses, most of them needless, the annual fire prevention day should not be regarded as a merely perfunctory observance. This occasion was set for October 9 this year, and the organizations of Roseburg ought to cooperate with this educational effort, and ask our people to adopt approved methods for reducing fire risks. It would seem as if every chamber of commerce and improvement and civic association would want to call attention to this subject at some one of their regular meetings at this season of the year. The period when cooler weather comes on is a time of special hazard as people start up their fires, and their stoves, heaters, chimneys, etc., often prove to be defective. Insurance men and fire department officials might well be requested to give brief talks on the subject of fire prevention. Certain careless popular habits greatly increase risks and losses can be reduced only by constantly calling public attention to these ways that add to the fire peril. Contractors and others intending to build should be urged to put up their structures in a way to resist fire, and to use fire proof stuff as much as they can. Business men should be urged not to let inflammable waste accumulate. Smokers should be cautioned to be careful with their matches and cigar ends. Housewives should be warned against letting stoves become overheated. Children start many fires and should be warned against the perils of matches. If careful habits in these and other respects could be promoted the terrible fire loss in this country could be reduced to a small fraction of the present amount.

Lack of interest in the compulsory school education bill is waning. As election day draws near the public generally is beginning to do a little reasoning of its own. While the issue still has many staunch supporters there is not that alertness in behalf of the measure as was at first displayed. Many people who, without due consideration and thought, gave sanction to the proposed school bill, now take an entirely different view of the matter. There is a feeling that parents should have the privilege of sending their children to any good school they may choose, and that their rights in this respect should not be challenged. If there are wealthy people who prefer private tutelage for their children, all good and well. If those of various religious beliefs wish to educate their offspring in a school under the leadership of their own particular faith, this is a matter, many declare, that should rest entirely with the parents. Just so long as all schools are fully Americanized, and there is nothing in their teachings that detract from good government and making good American citizens out of pupils attending these private schools, why upset this particular part of the state's educational program? Many good people are arguing that this proposed change in the school system of the state would be wrought with difficulties and that our educational system would be thrown into a chaotic state—mixing politics with religion—and in the end would bring about nothing of great value to the state in an educational way.

The complaint is sometimes made that business concerns throw out their older men with little human feeling, letting them go so that younger fellows with more pep and push can come in and make things go. Many firms, however, are doing their best to make use of their older employees, and they find that these fellows have their own value. They may not as a rule be quite as good in initiating new plans and starting new enterprises. But if they have been with a firm for some time, their experience has a tremendous value, and will save many mistakes. The firm that does take care of its older employees who have been with it for a considerable time, acquires a splendid reputation, and people like to enter such an employment. The result must be to make a body of employees loyal, and to unite the whole force in measures of hearty cooperation.

With the closing of the best state fair ever held in Oregon comes the announcement of the resignation of A. H. Lee, who has long been secretary of the state fair board. Mr. Lee, had an inkling that the axe was going to fall on his neck and rather than await developments slipped out from under his responsibilities. It is alleged that politics played a dominant factor in the resignation of the secretary. Efficiency don't count for much when the politician starts into get a fellow's scalp. Many a good man has been relegated to the rear to make room for a man of less capacity.

Certain unnamed "representatives of the department of justice" are declared in a federal grand jury report made public at Washington, D. C., to have withdrawn quantities of seized intoxicating liquor from storage during 1920 without due process of law and to have disposed of a part of it by appropriating it for their own use and by giving it to friends and relatives. We'll bet the "unnamed representatives" have a long trail of relatives and friends who are more than delighted to share in the distribution.

Another call is being sent broadcast for the "miserable refugees of Smyrna." Uncle Sam will be asked to play Santa Claus, not only for this cause but others in foreign lands. Wonder when a call will be sent up to the benefit of suffering humanity in our own country. And we sometimes wonder if it would not be a good idea to set our own people right with the world before spending millions among foreigners. There is plenty of room at home for spreading charity.

Politics make queer bedfellows. Here we have Walter L. Pierce, alleged Ku Klux Klan candidate for governor, warmly supported by Mr. Jesse Winburn, of Hebrew descent, reputed to be worth up into the millions. Before the present campaign is ended we might see some of the living devils flitting with the living angels.

Grey oats for fall seeding are worth 67 cents per bushel, which is higher than at this time last year. Fair grade of feed oats sell at \$1.50 per hundred. The egg market is strong, and retailers are paying from 40 to 45 cents per dozen for strictly fresh stock, but there is no great quantity available at the present.

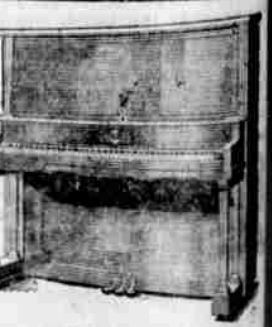
