SPECIAL FACTORY TO BUILD CLOSED CHEVROLET BODIES

According to Colin Campbell, General Sales Manager, Chevrolet Motor Co., Chevrolet is the lowest priced car on the market carrying a Fisher body, hence it has attracted buyers both from the lower and higher price classes because of the high quality of

the body and the engineering improvements in the chassis. Chevrolet is now the largest producer of closed cars of this quality.

In one year Chevrolet Motor Co. closed car requirement has increased from approximately 5 per cent of its volume to nearly 50 per cent and indications are that in 1923 more than half of its production will be closed cars.

The new Fisher Body Co. plants are located at Flint, Mich., Cincinnati, Ohio, Buffalo, N. Y., St. Louis, Mo., Janesville, Wis., and Oakland, Cal. 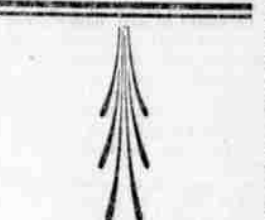
