Ludendorff Predicts German-French Alliance; Says Salvation of Both

Oct. 6.—Economic alliance between France and Germany and the end of all hostility between the two nations, General Ludendorff, 65 years old, hopes to see it quickly as possible, and expects it before his death.

General Ludendorff is convinced that if one could see the German people look forward to a different sort of future, the important interests they have in common with France for the re-establishment of Europe and the greater peace of the world, he told a correspondent of the Echo de Paris that he would have interviewed him at his Munich home.

General Ludendorff found the former president of a riding his hobby, he said, tending his fancy horses. He believed in France that secret preparations are being made to attack Germany, which, he said, "What does your opinion think on this subject?"

General Ludendorff replied, "I am certain that, if France finally realizes that the policy of opposing Germany is leading both nations to ruin she will sooner or later change her policy."

It was at this point that the General made his prophecy that the two peoples must and will become allies to safeguard their common interest.

Then, do you interpret, my friend, the next question, "The end of the war against France is to grow and grow among the people?"

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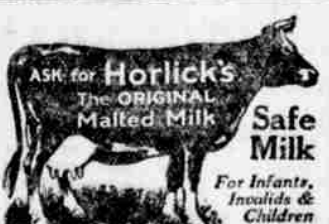
