The salute will be required hereafter only at the armory, on a military reservation, in the handling of official business or at the beginning and end of an official conversation. On social occasions, during games and at mess there will be no salutes.

"This is one of the biggest steps taken by the war department in Americanizing the American army," said General White. "If all the energy that was wasted in promiscuous and needless saluting during the world war had been utilized in bayonet thrusts the war should have ended much sooner."

Sues to Recover Lands In Coos

PORTLAND, Oct. 7.—Suit to recover lands in Coos county which A. J. Mayne secured on a sheriff's deed, was started in the federal court by the government. The government alleges in its complaint which was filed by S. W. Williams, special assistant attorney general, that the land in question, near Gravel Ford, Ore., was granted to the Coos Bay Wagon Road Co., for the construction of a wagon road from Roseburg to Coos Bay. Title later passed to the Southern Oregon company and later the land is said to have been turned back to the government. As the road companies did not pay taxes, the Coos county sheriff brought foreclosure proceedings and later sold the land to Mayne. The government contends the sheriff had no right to sell the land after the land had been returned to it and hold that the title to the property is not clear. If the government wins the suit Mayne will probably have to look to Coos county for reimbursement if he gets any.

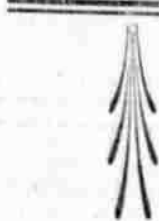

When the Puritans, a people who were supposed to have laid aside the pomp and vanities, went to church, they were summoned to Captain Standish's door by the roll of a drum. Each man wore a cloak and carried a musket on his shoulder. They fell in three abreast, led by a sergeant, and behind this escort strode Elder Brewster with Captain Standish strutting stiffly at his side, with a sword in scabbard and bearing a cane or wand as an emblem of his authority.
