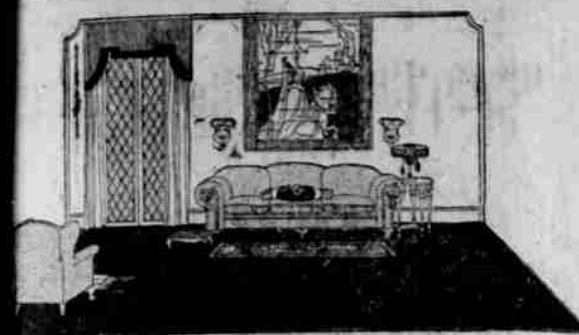

GOLDEN WEDDING IS CELEBRATED

Mr. and Mrs. Groves of Kelley's Korner Congratulated on Happy Occasion.

CHILDREN ARE PRESENT

Neighbors of Bride and Groom of Fifty Years Join With Them in Celebrating Wedding Anniversary.

Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Groves of Kelley's Korner celebrated their golden wedding anniversary on Monday evening, October 2.

At Mechanicsburg, Ohio on October 2, 1872, C. C. Groves and Grace Greenough were united in marriage. Shortly after their marriage they moved to Urbana, Ohio, where their four sons and two daughters were born. From Urbana they next moved to Kingman county, Kansas, and from Kansas they decided to take advantage of the government land thrown open to the public in Oklahoma, and made the race known as "the opening of the strip" in 1892. They were fortunate in obtaining a very valuable piece of land, and made their home on it for ten years. In 1902 another move was made to "No Man's Land," a strip of land in dispute by the states of Kansas and Texas, which was afterward annexed to Oklahoma. After 10 years on this site, they moved to the Cement quarry near Roseburg where Mr. Groves was in charge for three years. Their next move was to Kelley's Korner where they now reside and was the scene of Monday's celebration.

The decorations of the home were green and gold, two large yellow bells covered with marigolds, and yellow streamers decorated the living room. A basket of flowers suspended from the ceiling with streamers to the corners of the table with a huge wedding cake in white with golden decorations, completed the dining room color scheme. The bride cut the wedding cake, according to custom. A most splendid program of music and speaking was given. Many beautiful gifts were received, showing the high esteem in which Mr. and Mrs. Groves are held by their friends.

Two sons and one daughter were present. Rev. F. A. Groves from Gem, Kansas, accompanied by his wife, C. W. Groves of Glenkerry, another son, his wife, sons Herbert and Floyd and daughter Harriet, Mrs. O. M. Betts of Glenkerry, the only daughter present, her daughter, Margaret and son, Frank.

Two sons, P. H. Groves of Weatherford, Okla., and C. K. Groves of Willow Springs, Mo., and one daughter, Mrs. Maud Gignoux of Oklahoma, were not present, but all the children have visited their parents in the last four years.

Enrollment at U. of O. Breaks All Records

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 7.—Nearly 1,000 new full-time students, the majority of whom are freshmen, have entered the University of Oregon for the fall term, by far the record for new students in the university's 45 years of existence. The enrollment for the fall term will show an increase of 11 per cent over the 1921-1922 enrollment.

A total of 2125 full-time resident students have registered, according to the figures of Registrar Carlton E. Spencer announced today noon at the close of the registration for the first week. Numerous late registrations will begin appearing Monday, and the estimated attendance at Eugene for the fall term is 2,275.

The enrollment figures given in the foregoing include for the most part, residents of the state. The university does not draw heavily from outside states on account of its

non-resident fee of \$105 a year.

About 150 candidates for admission were rejected this fall, most of them from Oregon high schools. Of these about 45 per cent were rejected because they did not have the minimum of 15 Carnegie units. The remaining 52 per cent were rejected because they had not followed in high school the type of work best suited to prepare them for entrance to the university.

But for the strict enforcement of the rules of admission and the imposition of the non-resident fee, the university's growth this fall would presumably have exceeded 20 per cent.

If summer school were added to the regular session in the registration figures, the university would count for the present academic year considerably over 3,000. There has been a steady increase in enrollment since 1919-1920.

Suit Against Reedsport Attorney

W. S. Hatch today filed suit against Attorney J. H. Austin of Reedsport, alleging failure to turn over money claimed to have been collected on a promissory note. Hatch in his complaint which was filed in the Circuit court today, claims that he had a note for \$700.50 from the Reedsport Lumber Co., bearing interest at the rate of 5 per cent. The note became due and payable, he alleges, and was placed in the hands of Attorney Austin for collection, with the understanding that the attorney should receive \$50 as his fee and that the balance should be placed to the plaintiff's credit in the Reedsport bank.

The money was collected in several payments, he alleges, the full sum taken in by Attorney Austin being \$754.18. Of this amount Hatch claims that only \$100 was deposited to his credit, and he is now bringing suit to collect the \$654.18 which he alleges is due. He is also undertaking to attach property belonging to Attorney Austin to secure the amount of his claim. He is represented by Attorney J. Hawkins Napier.
