GILT-EDGED POLITICAL BUNK.

Walter Pierce, democratic candidate for governor, is making his campaign, according to his own edict, on a platform to reduce taxes throughout the state and is executing some very strong promises in regard to this part of his program, should he be elected governor at the November election. If Mr. Pierce intends to slaughter state taxes he should be careful what he takes on before election day, and should not be carrying any plank in his platform that has a tendency to further burden the taxpayers. If he would do this people generally would have more faith in his promises. Already he has aligned himself with the compulsory education bill, putting his stamp of approval on the measure, which, of course, if the school bill is approved at the November election, means a heavy burden of taxation immediately thrust upon the people of the state. A very conservative estimate of the cost of putting this bill into operation for the first five years is five million five hundred thousand dollars, or an average of one million one hundred thousand dollars a year. In all due respect to Mr. Pierce's profound sympathy for the downtrodden taxpayers of the state, why does he usurp and take unto himself before election day anything that has a tinge of higher taxation? If he is sincere in his protestations for lower taxes the school bill should have received his stamp of disapproval, purely on the grounds that the measure would increase taxation, which it will certainly do and the taxpayers will soon experience the burden and be compelled to foot the bill.

The truth of the whole matter is: Thinking people of the state of Oregon are beginning to take to election promises in a very mild form. They want some concrete results in regard to lessening the expense of state government. Too many candidates have been carried into public office on a platform that promises much but accomplishes nothing when its application is applied.

As this paper has stated time and again, don't be deceived by either candidate running for governor on a platform of lower taxation. The whole thing is a myth—pure and simple. A governor can and should do much in the way of lowering the state tax, but when he assumes to shoulder the entire burden of reducing taxation he carries a load on his shoulders that invariably slips off the day after election. He finds out that it can't be done. It is simply a before and after picture and when the pre-election hope leaves the voter he awakes to the realization that he has been cleverly buncoed.

A great relief would come to the taxpayers of Oregon if Governor Olcott or Mr. Pierce would inaugurate a program to do away with about two thirds or more of the state commissions, boards and whatnots that now exist and are gradually sapping the life blood from the people of the state. Neither of the candidates have touched upon this subject to any great extent, therefore we may expect nothing in the way of relief from this burden of taxation.

Again, don't forget—keep this thought well under your ivory dome—every county in the state should make a determined effort to get a pledge from their senators and county representatives to the legislature for strict economy. Then muzzle the voters who have a mania for voting for every new wrinkle to increase taxation, both state and county, and stand back of them to the finish—and then some.

It is a long way around to get noticeable results in the way of lower taxes, but if the people will just keep in mind that they are just as responsible for higher taxes, in many respects, as the office holder, eventually things will work out all right.

But no governor—republican or democrat—can carry off the honor individually—all promises to the contrary notwithstanding.

Therefore, why inveigle voters by any soft-soap method in the way of pre-election promises, the feasibility of which is too inconsistent to be worthy of any serious attention?

One of America's best known men died the other day, Rear Admiral Charles E. Clark, who commanded the Oregon when she made her famous trip from San Francisco to Cuba during the Spanish war. The reason for Admiral Clark's ability to meet a great emergency might be perceived from the note written in the journal of a member of the crew of the Oregon. This man wrote while off the Chilean coast on that historic voyage: "We all think Capt. Clark is going to be a ring tailed snorter for fighting. I don't think it will be easy to whip him, he seems to be so quick to catch on to every little thing, he is all over the ship at once and he talks to everybody, stops anyone to ask them anything he wants to know about the ship." This fellow, who had no special education, thus came pretty near stating what constitutes genius. The ability to handle a multiplicity of small details and make them work together to the desired end is the secret of attainment.

Politicians throughout the state are linking "Painless" Parker with Walter Pierce via Jesse Winburn, who recently made his debut into state politics. Well, "Painless" Parker has some pull—many of his patients will attest.

Well, Governor Olcott has finally "gone to the bat" and will now make an active campaign for re-election. This will put more fire under Walter, who has been on the job for the past two months.

It is going to take a hard-headed man to lower taxes in the state of Oregon. Better import Sild, the South African pug, who is noted for the thickness of his skull.

Olcott to Make an Active Campaign

PORTLAND, Oct. 11.—"From this time on I am going to take an active part in the campaign to the end that success may attend the Republican ticket in November," said Governor Olcott last evening in addressing the Multnomah county central committee.

"I have no message for you now, but I shall have rather an important one when next I speak before you."

Just in what way the governor intends taking an active part in the campaign was not indicated, but it is understood in inside political circles that he contemplates taking the stump against his opponent Walter M. Pierce, the Democratic nominee. Pierce has been making speeches throughout the state, and it is suggested by politicians close to the party councils that the governor may soon follow his opponent up, lay bare the sophistry of his arguments on the issues of the day, and present the achievements of the present Republican administration.

Congressman C. N. McArthur, National Committee member Ralph E. Williams and Republican Chairman Toose also addressed the committee.

W. E. Eddy, chairman of the committee, presided, and he assured those present that the committee would at all times be found on the firing line for the Republican cause.

Experts Says Boost in Rate Justified

PORTLAND, Oct. 11.—After a day stand the public service commission adjourned the Pacific Telephone rate hearing until October 12, at 10 o'clock in the morning, in order to give the company 10 days more to prepare and submit data asked for by the commission. The commission's experts 15 days in which to consider and digest what was offered.

But before the commission took adjournment two developments, coming to the spectators, if not to the principals in the case, relieved the mathematical tedium of the day—the testimony of Alexander Young and P. Newell, given in behalf of the phone company.

Both Young and Newell have been associated with the rate adjustment, the city of Portland and public service commission at different times and during prior consideration of the telephone rate cases. Both, in particular, had much to do in the formulation of the previous decision. Both went upon the stand and gave their testimony as expert accountant and disinterested consulting engineer to the effect that the accounts, records and amount system of the company were correct, while Newell contended that the rate increases given the company heretofore were not adequate in opinion.
