STANDARD OIL CUP WON BY ROSEBURG

Employees of Company, in this District, Win From All Others of State

EVENT 'IS CELEBRATED

Manager Hyland Arranges Banquet for Victorious Workers and Determination Is Expressed to Retain Cup in the City of Roseburg.

The employees of the Standard Oil company located within the Roseburg district, achieved a great victory over the other districts of the state during the month of September by winning the gold cup offered by the company to the district selling the largest percentage of Red Crown gasoline during the month. This cup is eagerly sought by the various districts and this is the first time it has been in this section of the state, and one of the few times the cup has been west of the mountains.

The employees of this district celebrated the victory by a big banquet at the Umpqua hotel last night and enthusiastically and unanimously decided that the cup must remain permanently in Roseburg, which result can be achieved only by three straight victories.

The Standard Oil company offers a beautiful gold cup to the district which makes the highest percentage of gasoline sales during the month. Each station is assigned a quota and the percentage above this quota is the basis on which this cup is presented. Heretofore the cup has been in eastern Oregon where large quantities of gasoline are consumed for development purposes and only on a few occasions has it come west of the mountains, so that the victory of the Roseburg employees is entitled to more than ordinary credit.

In celebration of the occasion, Manager Hyland last night arranged a sumptuous banquet which was given at the Umpqua hotel. Seventeen of the employees were present, and all were delighted by the achievement of this district. The employees are determined that the cup shall be permanently won by being held for three successive months, and every effort will be put forth to this end. A number of snappy, peppy sales talks were made, and salesmen discussed various methods of making sales and recounting of personal experiences which may prove of benefit to others.

Roseburg and Myrtle Creek sub-stations have entered into a competition on a percentage basis and the losing stations must provide a banquet for the opposing employees and their wives and families. This contest is expected to stir up much friendly rivalry within the district and will add to the volume of business so that Roseburg will have a chance to permanently hold the beautiful cup.

PAY INCOME TAXES

Statistics of federal income taxes paid into the bureau of internal revenue for 1920 show that two Oregon men paid taxes on incomes between \$500,000 and \$750,000, the total incomes of those two taxpayers being \$1,259,981, and the total tax paid \$714,128. There was one in the \$200,000 to \$400,000 class; \$259,000 to \$200,000 class; \$100,000 to \$150,000 class; \$75,000 to \$100,000 class; 25; \$40,000 to \$50,000 class; 79; \$20,000 to \$25,000 class; 130; \$15,000 to \$20,000 class; 276; \$14,000 to \$15,000 class 85; \$10,000 to \$11,000 class, 191. The total amount paid in Oregon was \$15,152,541. The per capita income tax paid in this state was \$9.45. Washington \$8.41 and Idaho \$7.22. Portland Journal.

WARREN ACQUITTED KILLING PROHIBITION AGENT

DALLAS, Ore., Oct. 12.—Philip Warren, on trial for the murder of Prohibition Agent Todd, was acquitted this afternoon by the trial jury. Warren will be tried again in the case of Price, also a prohibition agent, who, it is alleged, met death at the hands of Warren.

Allegations of the defense counsel that Warren was given liquor by the revenue officers he is accused of killing in order to trick him into giving or selling them liquor, and the testimony supporting this allegation given by Henry Pettie, another Indian, who was with Warren on the night of the double killing, were easily the outstanding features of the trial today.

The audience that crowded the court room and shuffled about in the seats became unusually quiet as the defense charged that Warren had been given a drink early in the evening by one of the members of the raiding party in a pool room, and that later the Indian had been again given booze at the dance hall by Todd and Price. A third man, also suspected of being an accomplice of the officers, shortly afterward gave Warren another drink outside the dance hall and cached the bottle, a small brown one, nearby, the defendant's attorney asserted.

AUTO THIEVES ROB AND BIND MOTORIST

Reward Man Who Gives Them Lift by Robbing and Binding Him to a Tree

TRACKS ARE FOLLOWED

Car Is Traced to Point South of Eugene and Owner of Car Is on Trail in Effort to Catch the Thieves.

E. W. Bellus, of Oregon City, arrived in Roseburg this afternoon accompanied by R. S. Hall, Chevrolet agent and garageman of Oregon City. They are endeavoring to apprehend three men who bound, gagged and robbed Mr. Bellus after he had kindly given them a lift on the highway and then made away with the Chevrolet car which he had rented from the garage.

Mr. Bellus states that he was traveling about three miles south of Oregon City when two men walking along the highway halted him and asked for a ride. Being alone he consented to give them a lift but as soon as they were in the car one of them shoved a revolver against his

side and ordered him to drive on down the highway.

After proceeding a short distance they picked up another man who took possession of the wheel and drove the car on a side road. After going a short way Bellus was forced to dismount and his watch, keys in money, fountain pen and \$15 were taken from him. He was then gagged and bound and tied to a near by tree. Before tying him the highwaymen buttoned his coat up around his neck telling him that he would probably not be discovered for some time and that his rolled up coat would help to keep him warm.

After they had left Mr. Bellus succeeded in loosening his bonds and reaching a nearby farmhouse where the officers were notified. Mr. Hall procured another car and immediately gave chase, the three men being tracked to a point near Eugene.

It is believed that they came through Roseburg and an effort is being made to check up on them. In the Portland police bulletin the three men are described as follows: No. 1, 30 years of age, wore glasses, black suit and had very peculiar eyes. No. 2, 30 years of age, wore brown hat, brown suit, brown shoes. The others called this man "chief". No. 3, 25 years old, greenish sweater, khaki trousers, leather leggings. Two of them carried guns.

Mr. Hall states that he will give \$25 for information leading to the return of the automobile.
