## Fire Commissioners Issue Strong Edict

A campaign on property owners who construct buildings without first securing permits, and particularly those within the fire limits who violate the ordinances by erecting buildings contrary to the city statutes, will be waged by the board of fire commissioners which is today serving notices that in the event buildings are constructed contrary to the laws that they will be torn down at once and a penalty provided according to the city's laws.

Recently several persons have put up wooden sheds within the business district contrary to law, it is stated, while on numerous occasions buildings have been constructed in the residence part of town without permits being secured. All new buildings, alterations, etc., must be done under permits issued by the secretary of the board of fire commissioners who may be found at the city hall at any time, and in the event such a permit is not secured, the person responsible for the construction or alteration, or repair, may be fined according to the city ordinance covering this matter.
