TENDERFOOT ON BRONCHO WINS COWBOY O. K.

BROADUS, Mont., Oct. 14.—William Rosenthal, of Chicago, son of Julius Rosenthal, president of Sears, Roebuck & Co., is "game to the core," in the belief of thousands of Montana citizens who attended the annual round up here last week and witnessed Rosenthal's attempt to ride a real bucking Montana cayuse.

Spectators at the opening program of the Broadus round up are convinced of the truth of the popular theory that the scions of Eastern wealth are all "riding for a fall," following Rosenthal's practical demonstration outside the corral of the fair grounds here.

But accomplishing Rosenthal's "fall" was no easy matter. It took a husky, range-bred and thoroughly "ornery" Montana cayuse to do it and Broadus is "telling the world" that Rosenthal is a dead game sport.

Picks Out One of the Toughest

Young Rosenthal, who was a guest at one of the ranches near Broadus, was one of the most interested spectators at the bucking contest and, with a crowd of cowboys and attaches of the ranch, stood near the corral where the bucking bronchos were kept until riders appeared for them. Nobody seems to know just how it happened, but suddenly the horrified eyes of the dude ranch manager beheld young Rosenthal, somewhat pale of face, but looking as though he'd stick it out or know why, seated atopone of the worst of the bucking cayuses and a hand outstretched to remove the blindfold from the eyes of the horse, with the eye opened to allow the animal to leave the corral and head for the space in front of the grandstand.

The ranchman, waving his arm, headed for the corral, pleading with the starters not to "let him do it, boys! He can't ride!" He never was on a bucking cayuse!

But that sort of thing was "old stuff." It had been pulled off last season, when two of the best riders ever seen at the Broadus show pleaded similarly for one of their pals, who would go with as pretty an exhibition of riding as anybody had ever seen and carried off all the prize money.

The crowd hooted, and the gate was opened, and the ranch host prepared to telegraph young Rosenthal's family

Plots Mother-in-Law's Death; Will Spend Life In Prison

(International News Service.)
BERLIN, Oct. 14.—Ex-Lieutenant Hans Heinrich Noetzel was found guilty in a Dresden court on the charge of instigating two men to murder his mother-in-law and adoptive mother, Martha Buerstinghaus, the widow of a rich brewery manager.

Afraid of committing the murder himself, Noetzel came to Berlin and offered two men he became acquainted with in a restaurant 50,000 marks and all the jewelry they would find on Mrs. Buerstinghaus if they would murder her, it was charged. His only aim was to inherit the immense fortune of his mother-in-law, which amounted to several million marks, it was declared.

A detailed plan was handed out by him to the hired men containing the exact description of the residence of the victim and the circumstances under which the murder was to take

place, the testimony disclosed. He and his mother-in-law would return from a theatre performance and pass through the park of her residence, when Noetzel would leave her alone for a while under some pretext. Then the murderers should come forth, knock her down, kill and rob her.

The two confederates, lower clerks in a Berlin bank, seemed to be willing to carry out the mission, but, after blackmailing Noetzel for a while, reported the whole plan to the police, who arrested the ex-lieutenant the moment he entered the park accompanied by his mother-in-law.

Before court Noetzel denied the whole story, asserting that it existed only in the imagination of the said two men, who wanted to make money out of him.

The court found Noetzel guilty and sentenced him to life imprisonment.

Emulates Punched As Best He Can.

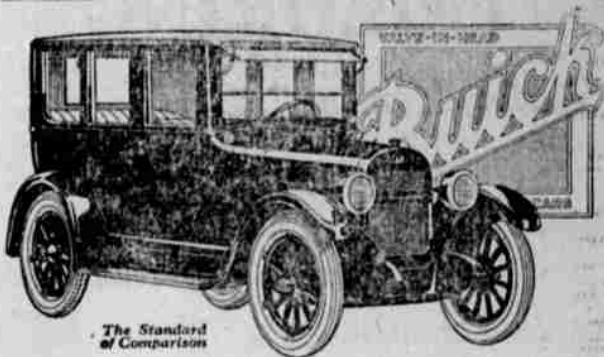
