Sale of Local Theatre Pending

L. L. Harrell and W. W. McFarland, both of Cottage Grove, arrived here today and are negotiating for the purchase of the Anti-ers and Majestic Theatres in this city. Negotiations for the sale of these two movie houses have been under way for several days, and the prospective new owners arrived this morning to make inventories and conclude the deal in the event the matter can be satisfactorily arranged.

Contrary to reports published in Portland papers the deal has not yet been concluded. But it is believed that a satisfactory agreement can be reached either today or tomorrow and the necessary papers signed.

Both Mr. Harrell and Mr. McFarland are experienced show men and are thoroughly versed in handling a business of this nature. They expect to continue the high class of pictures now being shown in the city and will continue the management along the same satisfactory lines as present.

C. F. Hill the present manager of the theatres has not yet made plans for his future business activities. He is a veteran theatre man and was the head of the Globe Theatre Company which for several months operated a large chain of theatres. He has gradually sold off his interests in these theatres and he holds only the management of the two local theatres which he has been conducting in a very satisfactory manner during the past few years. He states that in the event the two local theatres are sold that he will remain in Roseburg for at least a month and may possibly go into other lines of business here.

The transfer of management will take place about the first of the month, according to present plans.

CHICAGO, Oct. 15.—In an effort to further reduce the hazards of automobile the Pennsylvania Railroad has promulgated these rules for auto drivers:

- 1—When approaching the railroad and before crossing the tracks
- 2—Shift into lower gear to prevent stalling on the tracks.
- 3—Look in both directions.
- 4—Listen.
- 5—Don't try to beat a train over a crossing stop if a train is approaching.
- 6—After a train has passed, make sure that no others are approaching from either direction.
- 7—Be doubly careful at night and on strange roads.

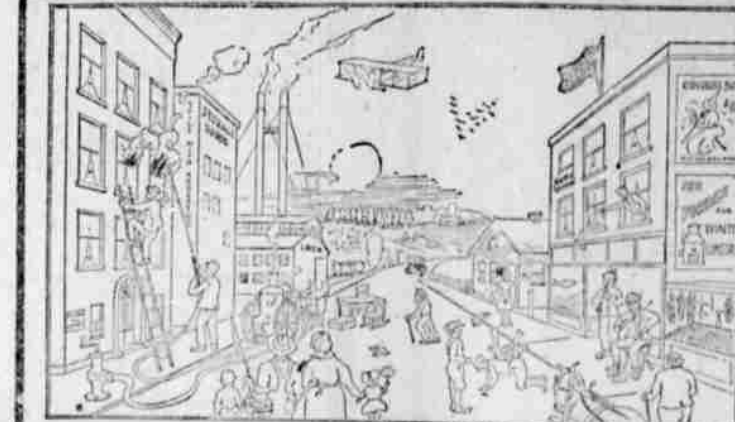
