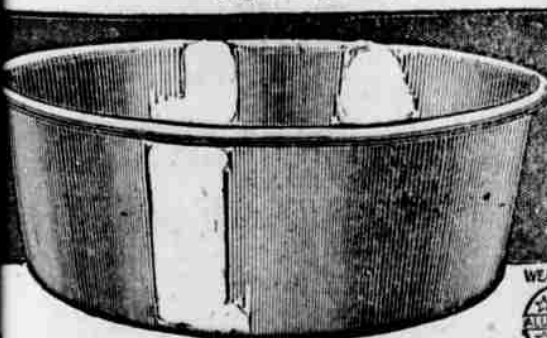
Wed. Night Maccabees Hall

Norman and wife are also located at Tiller, the former being employed in the government service. Walter, another son, and his wife are in charge of the store at that place and are enjoying a good run of trade.

Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Poole are now in charge of the hotel at Tiller and are mighty accommodating people. Their tables are supplied with wholesome food and patrons are given the very best service. They are experiencing a very nice business and are looking after the wants of the people at home as well as the transient public.

Isadore Rouds, road supervisor in the Tiller district, has just started some road work between the Parker grade and Tiller. The road between Perdue and Tiller is badly in need of some substantial work.
