Imperial Highness in Royal Tantrum

(International News Service.) PEKING, Oct. 20.—His Imperial Highness, Emperor of the World, Los Angeles, is in a royal tantrum because Emperor Haian Tung, retired ruler of China, doesn't answer his letters. There may be a falling out in the king's union, but just now the Los Angeles potentate is blaming it on the China postoffice.

"I, the Imperial Commander of the Royal American Military Forces, recently wrote to my beloved friend the Emperor of China," wrote the Emperor of the World of Los Angeles to "The Postmaster of Peking."

"So far I have received no reply and as we are very prompt in all our correspondence I am convinced that you have lost or detained the letter. You are requested to attend to this matter at once and see that the letter is delivered."

The signature was in a flowing kindly hand of the old school. "The Peking Postmaster" replied: "We beg to inform your highness that mail addressed to the Emperor of China is delivered promptly by carriers assigned to the Forbidden City, where he now lives, and we are sure that if your letter reached this office and was properly addressed, it was delivered. We suggest that you take the matter up directly with the Manchu household."

It is believed in Peking that the failure to answer was an oversight as the Emperor of China is a busy boy just now and likely to be somewhat flustered and absent-minded. He is getting ready for his marriage to two women. The wedding preparations are elaborate and the ceremony was recently postponed from October 26 to a day in November yet to be selected.

Klamath Woman Is After Judgeship

(By United Press.) KLAMATH FALLS, Oct. 20.—Women sometimes have a way of getting what they go after, and Miss Lettie Fischer wants to be police judge of Klamath Falls. She dropped a smart lookin' toge into the political ring last week and announced that her supply of feminine intuition and spirit of fair play, cultivated for 26 years, is at the disposal of those in trouble with the law.

Miss Fischer at present is clerk of the council and performs most of the duties in connection with the police court bench, vacant since Judge A. L. Leavitt's elevation to the circuit court. Mayor W. H. Wiley has been judge pro-tem.

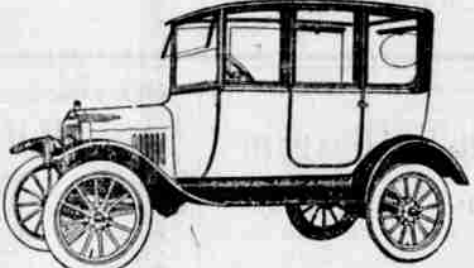
